And it is hereby further Ordered, That Her Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent number of Copies of the said Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, in order that the same may be forthwith sent round and read in the several Churches and Chapels of England and Wales, and of the Town of Berwick-on-Tweed.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, to be observed in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, for the late abundant Harvest, which Merciful dispensation has been extended to this Province, I have therefore thought fit, by the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, in imitation of Her Majesty's pious example, to issue this Proclamation, hereby appointing a general Thanksgiving to Almighty God, to be observed throughout this Province on Sunday the twentieth day of this instant November, and I do hereby direct the Form of Prayer which the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia has prepared for the better and more devout solemnization of the same, to be used in all Churches and Chapels and other places of Public Worship within this Province; and do strictly charge and command that the said Public Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all Her Majesty's loving subjects within the same.

General Post Office, Halifax.

SIR,—By the accompanying copy of a letter from Lieutenant Colonel Maberly, you will see that the patronage of the Post Office Department in New Brunswick, is now vested in the Lieutenant Governor of that Province.

The duty which devolves upon you in consequence, is clearly pointed out. Supplies of Form No. 1, have been sent to the Post Masters in New Brunswick, with directions to fill up and forward to you one of the said Forms whenever a vacancy occurs, which immediately upon receipt of it, you will transmit to His Excellency the Governor.
