The following Circular has been addressed and forwarded to the several
 Clerks of the Peace, and is now Published by Order of His Excellency the
 Lieutenant Governor:—

SECRETARY'S OFFICE,

FREDERICTON, 11th April, 1842.

SIR,—His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor having had under his con-
 sideration the very defective and unsatisfactory system under which Licences
 for keeping Parish Schools have been granted, has directed me to desire you
 to draw the attention of the Trustees of Schools and Boards of Education,
 in your County, to the instructions herein inclosed, which His Excellency is
 desirous should be conformed to in all future cases, when application for
 such Licences may be made, in addition to the Regulations which have
 already been prescribed in regard thereto. I am further directed to call
 your attention to the seventh Section of the Act 7 W. 4, c. 8, which must
 be strictly observed; and you are to transmit regularly every six months to
 the Lieutenant Governor certified Copies of the Returns therein required, to
 be made by the Teachers of Schools.

You will also take care to call upon the Justices of the Peace of the County,
 to make regularly the Returns required by the 8th Section of the same Act.

The following Regulations to be observed and strictly followed,
 in all applications for Licences to keep Parish Schools, in addition
 to the Regulations which have already been prescribed in regard
 thereto, are published by Order of His Excellency the Lieutenant
 Governor.

1st. That every Candidate shall produce a recommendation
 from the Trustees of the School proposed to be established, who
 are also to state the situation of the School, and the number of the
 children of either sex attending, or likely to attend it.

2nd. In addition to the Certificate of religious and moral
 character, required from the Minister of the Congregation to which
 the Candidate may have belonged, the Minister of the Communion
 to which the children, or a majority of them may belong, should be
 requested to certify either from his own knowledge, or from diligent
 enquiry, that the Candidate is a fit Person to be entrusted with the
 charge of the School; and the resident Minister of any other
 Communion to which any of the children may belong, may also
 certify his opinion of the Candidate. In cases of Male applicants, it
 should be specified whether they are married or single men.

3rd. The Boards of Education, on these Certificates being ex-
 hibited to them, are to proceed to examine the Candidate in regard
 to his or her literary qualifications, specifying in their report all the
 particulars before required to be set forth, and whether the Candidate
 may previously have taught in any School, licenced, or unlicenced,
 in which case a Certificate from the Trustees of such School to be
 required, setting forth the cause of removal; and the original (or
 copies) of such Certificates so produced, to accompany the Report
 of the Board, which it is requested may in all cases be signed by
 the several members who have examined the Candidate, who will
 in no future case, receive a Licence, or the renewal of one, without
 the information herein required, and no Warrant will hereafter be
 granted for the Stipend of any Teacher, who has not received a
 Licence for the School in which he is employed.

The following Circular is addressed to the several Supervisors of
 Great Roads, and published by Order of His Excellency the
 Lieutenant Governor:—

SECRETARY'S OFFICE, Fredericton, March 9, 1842.

[Circular.]

SIR,—The amount granted this year for the Great Roads being
 not more than will be required to keep them in a passable state, I
 am directed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to instruct
 you to confine your operations to that object; and for this purpose,
 after having made the requisite examination, you will proceed at
 once publicly to advertize for Labourers and engage them, as soon
 as the work can be performed, to clear the Drains, and make the
 requisite Repairs.

As the employment of the Labouring Poor is, from the peculiar
 circumstances of the Country, now an object of paramount im-
 portance, you will employ Day Labourers to the full extent per-
 mitted by the Law, taking care at the same time to keep the rates
 of wages as low as may be practicable; and when Contracts are
 to be made, you will call for them also by public advertisement, and
 take care to insert particularly the time within which the work is to
 be completed, and that it will be paid for in money when finished.

In employing Day Labourers it will be found advantageous to
 engage them in gangs, under some one man of the party, who should
 act as Foreman and Overseer, and with whom the agreement for the
 rate of wages should be made, but the payments to be made by
 yourself to each individual employed. By this mode it is believed
 that the men will be checks upon each other, and being associated
 together by agreement among themselves, they will labour cheer-
 fully and the work will be more faithfully and effectually performed.

You will report to His Excellency from time to time, the pro-
 gress of the work and state of the Road, and you will take care to
 transmit to the Auditor General regular Accounts, with the requisite
 Vouchers, on or before the fifteenth day of October next.
