On Tuesday last the following Address from the Magistrates and other Inhabitants of Fredericton, was presented to Lieut. Col. MONINS on the departure of the 69th Regt. who was pleased to make the subjoined reply:

To Lieutenant Colonel EATON MONINS, Commanding Her Majesty's 69th Regiment of Foot, and Senior Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Troops in New Brunswick.

SIR,

Commanding in New Brunswick.

Fredericton, N. B., June 7, 1842.

The first detachment of the 52nd Light Infantry arrived here on Tuesday last, under the command of Lieut. HAWKINS, and on Tuesday evening the head quarters of the Regiment, commanded by Lt. Col. BLOIS, came up in the New Brunswick, steamer; that of the 69th returning to St. John, under the command of Lt. Col. MONINS, on Wednesday.

#### ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER COLUMBIA!

The steam ship *Columbia* arrived at Halifax on the 31st ult., in 11 days from Liverpool, having left on the 19th of May. She brought only 17 passengers.
