SIR,—I have the honor to acquaint you that the Post Master General has deemed it expedient to send out an Officer of his Department to inspect and report upon the Post Office Establishments in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. His Lordship has accordingly appointed Mr. WILLIAM PAGE to perform the duty, and has instructed him to take his departure for Halifax by the Packet of the 5th instant. I have to desire that you would afford Mr. Page, as far as your Government is concerned, every facility and assistance which he may require in the execution of his Mission.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

IT appearing that doubts have arisen respecting the regulations established for the renewal of School Licences; Public Notice is hereby given, That all Teachers now actually employed and who, previous to obtaining their Licences, were examined and approved by a Board of Education, are not required to be re-examined, but may have their Licences renewed, for the Parishes in which they are now engaged, upon producing a recommendation from the Trustees of Schools for the Parish, and from a resident Minister of the Congregation or Denomination to which the Children attending the School chiefly belong.

Such Teachers as have not been examined and approved by a Board of Education, must be examined by the Board of Education in the County in which they are employed, or intend to be employed, and must produce the regular Testimonials required by the regulations heretofore published.

Teachers applying for a renewal of their Licences, and wishing to remove to another Parish, must, in addition to the recommendation of the Trustees with whom they are about to engage also, produce a Certificate from the Trustees where they have been employed, testifying their good conduct, and setting forth the reasons of their removal.
