At St. Paul's Church, Charlotte Town, on Tuesday the 5th instant, by the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, Rector, and Ecclesiastical Commissary, Frederick R. Starr, Esq., of Halifax, to Mary Jane, eldest daughter of the Honorable Edward James Jarvis, Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island.

Died.

At Saint John, on the 8th instant, Captain Joseph Hamm, one of the oldest Shipmasters belonging to that port, in the 50th year of his age.

At Halifax, on the 9th instant, the Rev. Dr. McCulloch, long known as one of the leading minds that have given Nova Scotia some claim to literary distinction. He was a man of vast mental attainments, and a profound investigator into the mysteries of nature. He died at the ripe age of 67.

To Lieutenant Colonel WILLIAM BLOIS, Commanding the 52nd Light Infantry and Her Majesty's Troops in the Province of New Brunswick.

SIR,—The undersigned Office-Bearers of the Choral Society of Fredericton have learned, with the deepest regret, that your gallant corps is under orders for Halifax, and will shortly be removed from this Garrison.

In common with every Inhabitant of Fredericton, we have observed with no ordinary pride and satisfaction, the orderly and Soldierlike deportment of your men, their admirable discipline, the courteous bearing of your Officers, and the kindness with which on every occasion, you have consulted the wishes of the Inhabitants.

Towards ourselves and the object of our Institution, your attention has been truly paternal, and the assistance of your splendid Band has enabled us to establish, (and, we trust, on a permanent basis,) a delightful means of intellectual and moral enjoyment for the Members of our Society, and the Inhabitants of Fredericton at large.

In the recollection of the fact, that without this assistance, our Society could not have been thus established, we contemplate its past success and present standing, with emotions of the warmest gratitude, and confidently trust, that through many years to come, that gratitude will find appropriate expression in constant cultivation of that musical taste which your kindness has so essentially contributed to promote among us.

Wherever, in the arrangements of Divine Providence, the lot of the Fifty Second shall be cast, and whether it shall ever again be our privilege to welcome its familiar faces to our shores, be assured that, in earnest and honest truth, our best sympathies will still be with it, and that no happiness nor honor can befall any individual connected with your Regiment, which shall not afford us the most sincere gratification.
