DEATH OF SIR CHARLES BAGOT.

[From the Canada Gazette Extraordinary.]

"With deep sorrow the Governor General announces to the public the afflicting intelligence of the demise of His Excellency the late Governor General, Sir Charles Bagot, which took place this morning at 3 o'clock.

"The Governor General has no doubt that all classes will join in testifying their heartfelt grief at this melancholy event.

The Royal Mail Steam Packet Acadia arrived on Tuesday, at 2 o'clock, P. M., after a rapid passage of 11 days from Liverpool, bringing London dates to the 18th and Liverpool to the 19th ult., the contents of which are of more than ordinary interest and importance.

REPEAL AGITATION.—In the House of Commons, on the 8th instant, Mr. O'Brien inquired of Mr. Eox, whether he intended to proceed with his motion on the subject, and whether it was his intention, on that occasion, to move for a call of the House?

Mr. Fox said, that when, on giving notice of these motions, he mentioned his intention of having the House called over, he did so in order to secure the attendance of the Irish members, as he thought the subject of great importance to their country. He did

not wish to bring forward his motion in the absence of Mr. O'Connell, to whom he would write on the subject, and proceed at any time which he (Mr. O'C.) should then state as convenient for his attendance.

In the House of Lords, on the 9th instant, the Earl of Roden inquired whether the government had taken measures to put a stop to the agitation now proceeding in Ireland on the subject of Repeal. He was induced to draw attention to this subject, as he conceived it to be of first importance; and if the government did not interfere in the matter, for the protection and encouragement of their loyal subjects in Ireland, the consequences might be most disastrous, as the avowed object of the repealers was, the dismemberment of the empire.

The Duke of Wellington, in reply, said, the government were fully aware of the extent to which the agitation had proceeded in Ireland, and the dangerous consequences which might follow its continuance; they were, therefore, determined to adopt every measure calculated to maintain the union, and prevent disturbances in that country.

Lord Jocelyn, in the House of Commons, put the same question to the government, when Sir R. Peel said, he was authorised, on the part of Her Majesty, to state her intention to maintain, inviolate, the legislative union; and though he deprecated all war, especially civil war, he would resort to this alternative rather than allow the dismemberment of the empire.

Sir Robert Peel acknowledges, through the *Times*, the receipt of £200 from an anonymous person, to be devoted to the reduction of the national debt.

The presents which have been sent to Queen Victoria from the Emperor of China, consists of golden bedsteads and a quantity of silk of a sort which has never yet been seen in Europe. There were likewise two ear drops worth £1,000 each.

Major Fraser, who arrived last week from the East Indies, has brought magnificent presents for the Queen from the King of Lahore. They are worth about £12,000.

THAMES TUNNEL.—574,000 persons had passed through the Tunnel since its opening. 20 shops for the sale of fancy articles had been opened in the Tunnel. Shops on London Bridge, in the olden day, were considered a curious occupation of space—shops under the bed of the river, is a much greater stretch of ingenuity. If both existed together, the Father of British streams would have good cause to complain of being circumvented and surrounded by the busy tribe among which he moves.

THE COLOSSEUM had been sold, at auction, for 23,000 guineas.

QUEEN'S VISIT.—An official intimation had been received in Dublin, respecting the contemplated visit of the Queen, to Ireland, in the course of the summer. Her Majesty is expected to arrive in July, and leave for Scotland, in August.

TROOPS FOR IRELAND.—Troops were under orders to proceed from Liverpool to Ireland. The United Service Gazette says, that the movement was occasioned by information of an intent to stop the Mails, which were to leave Dublin on the 29th of May, under a new contract by Mr. Croall of Edinburgh. The Coaches, for the contract, had arrived in Ireland from Glasgow,—and were guarded during their progress through Dublin to the place of deposit, by the police.

Mr. Brunel, the eminent engineer, is now out of danger, the half-sovereign having been dislodged from the windpipe, on Saturday, in the presence of Sir Benjamin Brodie and Mr. Aston Key.
