Peace assembled, beg to present to the Court as follows, viz :---

That a loathsome and frightful Disease has existed in Tracadie, Commander in Chief of the Province of New in this County, for some years past, pronounced by an eminent Physician to be a species of Leprosy; that it principally, if not altogether, prevails among the poorer classes, who are unable to procure for themselves suitable medical advice, care and attention, but are left to the mercy of their neighbors in their affliction. The people, however, alarmed at the disease, generally shun the afflicted, and have hitherto been in the habit of confining, in some instances, the Leper in a log enclosure constructed for the purpose, far apart from other habitations, and then, by means of a hole cut in the logs. providing him with food until he can no longer feed himself, when of course he dies; a practice the most revolting to humanity, and discreditable to the country in which it is allowed to be followed.

We have now learned with great regret that this distemper is spreading itself over that part of the country, and that there are about twenty cases at present in Tracadie and its neighborhood. Under these circumstances, the safety of the public health, no less than the cause of humanity, demand that some effort should be made to relieve and succour these afflicted creatures, other than the shocking mode now used; and we beg that the Justices in Session will cause a representation of these facts to be transmitted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with a request that he will use his influence to obtain a small sum of money from the Province Treasury to be applied to the building of a Lazaretto or Leper House, and the hire of a suitable person to attend the sick.

SIR,-About three years since, some of the principal Inhabitants of Tracadie, in this County, represented to me that a strange disease had made its appearance there some years before-that it appeared incurable—that it was then confined to one or two families, but that great apprehension existed lest it should spread its ravages, and that it might be found necessary to assess the Parish for the support of the sick; as the people being for the most part very poor, the exaction of a money Tax would be grievously felt by them. I then recommended them to relieve the afflicted to
