The Saw Mills are capable of containing as many Gangs as there are now single Saws, which could be substituted at little cost; they are in perfect order, and some of the Gangs could be driven throughout the entire year, as there are always several of the Saws kept going during the entire Winter; and the Grist Mill has the same advantage. The Dam is in perfect and complete order, having been completed at very great expense, and runs entirely across the River Nashwaak, thus securing the whole waters of the River for the driving of the Mills.

Connected with the Mills there is a fine large Store, well adapted for the business of the Country, also a Blacksmith's Shop, and a good Cottage and Garden attached, well suited for the Manager of the Mills, besides a number of Houses suitable for the Workmen at the Mills.
