The following Address was presented by the Magistracy of Queen's County to His Honor Mr. Justice Street:—

*To His Honor GEORGE FREDERICK STREET, Esquire, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Supreme Court of Judicature, for the Province of New Brunswick.*

We, the Magistrates of Queen's County, most cheerfully avail ourselves of the occasion of this your Honor's first appearance amongst us in your judicial character, to tender to you our congratulations on your accession to the high and important station to which Her Most Gracious Majesty has been pleased to elevate you.

The appointment to that Office, of a Gentleman so distinguished by talents, high principle, and experience as your Honor, as evinced in the various and important situations which it has fallen to your lot so usefully to fill, demands from the inhabitants of this Province, and from ourselves especially, an expression of the gratitude they owe to Her Most Gracious Majesty, in thus securing the best and most vital interests of Her loyal subjects.

And while we have deeply to deplore the cause which induced your Honor's highly esteemed predecessor, Judge Botsford, at so great a personal sacrifice, and from motives so purely patriotic and disinterested, to give place to your Honor's appointment, we have to congratulate ourselves, and the other Counties of the Province, in the appointment of a Judge as his successor, from whose eminent qualifications and virtues, a pure, wise and faithful administration of the Laws, may with full confidence be relied upon.

We have long known you in your Professional character in this County, which has ever received our highest respect, distinguished as it has been by kindness and urbanity in your intercourse among us.

We now bid you welcome in your Honorable character of Judge, praying that Providence may extend to you a long and happy life of usefulness, in the discharge of the high functions pertaining to your Office.

To which His Honor made the following Reply:—

*Gentlemen of the Magistracy of Queen's County.*

The very complimentary Address you have presented me on this my first entrance to your County, in my Judicial capacity, calls for my best thanks, which I now sincerely return you, and be assured, I feel most deeply the kind and friendly sentiments you have therein expressed, and although I cannot, I fear, claim to myself the merit of deserving all the encomiums you have thus paid to my qualifications to fill the high and important Office it has pleased Her Majesty to bestow upon me, yet, as I know they spring from the kindly dispositions of your hearts towards me, I receive them in the sense they are conveyed, with grateful feelings, and it shall be my study to prove by close and vigilant attention to the high duties now imposed on me, that the confidence you have so flatteringly expressed, is not misplaced.

I most sincerely unite with you in deploring the cause which has given rise to the retirement of my highly respected and esteemed friend and predecessor, Judge Botsford, whose long and faithful services will not, I trust, be overlooked by the Legislature of the country; and I cannot but feel, that in succeeding such a man, it behoves me to be the more strenuous in my exertions to prevent the people of the Province sustaining loss in the administration of justice by this change.

Allow me also to thank you for your kind and good wishes for my personal welfare, expressed in the concluding part of your Address, and I sincerely hope we shall all often meet here in the same mutual good feeling now expressed.
