Lord Elgin, the new Governor General, is residing at present at Broom Hall, in Fifeshire, and it is understood that he does not intend to depart for Canada till the end of next month.

Sir H. Pottinger has been appointed Governor of the Cape of Good Hope.

Lieutenant Colonel Reid has been appointed Governor of Barbadoes and the adjacent Islands.

The Jersey Herald, containing the account of the Queen's visit, has been or is to be printed on satin, and presented to Her Majesty.

Mohammed Ali, according to the Topic, has, by his own admission, spent about five millions sterling in the attempt to establish manufactures in Egypt. For his buildings and machinery a French company lately offered him £12,000.

Mr. Smith O'Brien has been reinstated in the commission of the peace.

Pius IX. has removed some books from the list of those forbidden to be read by all members of the Church.

An annual average of about £330,000 has been collected on account of the Free Church of Scotland for the last three years.

Only three of the Lord Chancellors of Ireland have been natives of that country.

The Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, has been in constant communication with the Lord Lieutenant, in reference to augmenting the salaries of the curates of the establishment in Ireland.

The Russian works from the Caspian to the Black Sea are advancing rapidly.

It is said that the Princess Royal of Denmark has consented to be divorced.

The foundation stone of the Menai Tunnel Suspension Bridge was laid on the 25th ult. Very little ceremony was observed on the occasion.

The King of the Belgians will, it is stated, leave the Tyrol, and arrive in Paris at the end of this week.

The daughter of the Queen of Madagascar has espoused a Frenchman, M. Maxime Lepellier, who is the possessor not only of a princess, but of one of the largest beef salting establishments in the country.

Sir Charles Wetherell's personal estate has been administered to by Lady Wetherell, and a stamp duty paid on £250,000.

In excavating for the Wakefield and Goole Railway a human skeleton 7 feet 6 inches long was found near Snaith.

A public meeting has been held at Newcastle-on-Tyne, for the purpose of forming a society to advance the art of teaching, and elevate the condition of the schoolmaster.

The squadron of evolution has been actively manoeuvred, under the command of Sir W. Parker, off Cadiz, Gibraltar, and Tangier.

Arrival of the Count de Montemolin and General Cabrera in London.—A respectable correspondent has communicated to us the following intelligence:—"General Cabrera arrived in London on Friday evening, and the Count de Montemolin, who had been expected on Saturday, reached town on Sunday morning. The Count has, since his arrival, kept a very strict *incognito*, being denied even to his most devoted followers. General Cabrera has, however, had an interview with the Ambassador of a European power. It is said that a proclamation, issued since that which appeared in the Standard, of yesterday, and which has not yet been publicly circulated, has greatly disappointed the Exaltados, who look upon the courting of Espartero as a dereliction of principle. It is also said that Espartero is exceedingly averse to enter again upon Spanish politics."—*Morning Herald*.

SPAIN.—The parties connected with Spain here, as merchants, have been placed in a state of anxiety by the rumors (which there is to much reason to believe are correct,) that the 25th of the present month is the day named for a general rising or revolt, against the marriage of the Infanta and the Duke de Montpensier; at any rate, it is considered certain that, should the marriage be performed, a state of excitement and alarm will prevail for a considerable time to come, by which the commercial intercourse of that country must be most materially impeded.—*Sun*.
