Whereupon the following Resolutions are unanimously adopted:

On motion of Mr. G. F. Williams,

Resolved, That inasmuch as a most destructive conflagration has recently reduced to ashes a large portion of the City of St. John's, Newfoundland, and deprived a number of families and individuals of their homes and property, an occurrence which must necessarily cause an immense amount of sorrow and distress, this Meeting deeply sympathize with those unfortunate sufferers, and regarding them as proper objects of benevolence, call upon the Inhabitants of this County, to unite with this and other parts of the sister Province, in affording such pecuniary aid, as may tend in some measure, to relieve the wants of a suffering community.
