EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS.

House of Assembly, Tuesday, February 2.

On motion of Mr. Ritchie,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct the several Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, as well those appointed by the Crown as those elected under the Charter of the City of Saint John, forthwith to make up and forward to the Provincial Secretary, for the information of this House, a particular Return, embracing a period of three years, from the first day of January 1844 to the first day of January 1847, of all trials, suits or prosecutions had before them respectively, commenced by seamen against the masters or owners of any ships or vessels for the recovery of wages claimed to be due; specifying the names of the parties, the ship or vessel, where owned, and the voyage or period for the service on board which the said proceedings were instituted; together with the amount claimed, the result of the action-and when in favor of the Plaintiff, the amount of the debt for which judgment was given, and the amount of all costs, with the items, in each and every case.

Ordered, That Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Wilson, and Mr. Landry, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.
