WHEREAS it appears by an Inquest held on the twenty first day of May instant, before the Coroner of the City and County of Saint John, on view of the body of a new born Male Infant then lying dead, that the said Infant came to its death by a blow or blows inflicted by some person or persons unknown: I do therefore publish this Proclamation, and do hereby offer a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to whomsoever shall give such information to Her Majesty's Attorney General of the person or persons by whom this offence was committed, as will enable him to prosecute the offender or offenders to conviction.

A PROCLAMATION.

FOR A GENERAL FAST.

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God to visit the iniquities of the Nation by a grievous scarcity and dearth of divers articles of sustenance and necessities of life, in several parts of the United Kingdom: And whereas Her Majesty, trusting in the mercy of Almighty God, that, notwithstanding the sore punishment which He hath laid upon Her Majesty and Her people, He will, if we return to Him in due contrition and penitance of heart, withdraw His afflicting hand, has commanded that a Public Fast and Humiliation should be observed throughout the United Kingdom: And whereas it is highly becoming that so pious an example should be imitated in this part of Her Majesty's Dominions, I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, hereby to appoint Wednesday the sixteenth day of June next, to be a day of Public Fasting and Humiliation to be observed throughout the Province, that we may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our sins, and may in the most devout and solemn manner send up our prayers and supplications to the Divine Majesty, for the removal of those heavy judgments which our manifold sins and provocations have most justly deserved, and fervently to implore the Divine favor and protection on behalf of our Most Gracious Sovereign and Her People: And whereas a suitable Form of Prayer has been prepared for this purpose by the Honorable and Right Reverend the Bishop of Fredericton; I do hereby authorize and appoint the same to be used

on this solemn occasion in all Churches and Chapels throughout this Province, and I do hereby solemnly enjoin all Her Majesty's loving subjects in this Province, reverently and devoutly to observe the said Public Fast, as they tender the favor of Almighty God, and would avert His wrath and indignation.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the fourteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty seven, and in the tenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

THE particular attention of the Deputy Treasurers at the several Out Ports in the Province, acting as Government Emigration Agents, is called to the "Rules under which money may be remitted through Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, for the assistance of Emigrants after their arrival in British North America," published in the Gazette of the 28th of April last, and a strict observance of the annexed Heads of Instructions is enjoined.

In case of the arrival of Emigrants before the remittance, the Deputy Treasurers are authorized to make the necessary advances on being fully assured of the facts, and they will forthwith report the circumstances for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Heads of Instructions to the Government Agents in Canada and New Brunswick, for relieving Emigrants on arrival, out of private funds deposited for the purpose with the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners in England.

1. With a view of affording facilities to Landlords and others who may be desirous of assisting Emigrants after their arrival in Canada and New Brunswick, Her Majesty's Government have sanctioned the arrangements contained in the accompanying paper, which sufficiently explains the details of the Plan so far as regards all proceedings in England.

2. It will be observed that those persons who wish to avail themselves of the plan, must deposit with the Commissioners the money to be remitted to the Colony, making out in duplicate and in a prescribed form a list of the Emigrants to be assisted, and specifying the manner in which the assistance is to be afforded.

3. On the face of this list the Commissioners will certify that the money has been lodged with them, and they will cause to be forwarded one copy by the Ship in which the Emigrants sail, and the other by the next Mail Steamer, both addressed to the Government Emigration Agent at the Port of disembarkation. This list will also bear a certificate signed by the Government Emigration Agent or Officer of Customs at the Port of embarkation, shewing how many of the people originally placed on the list by the depositor, actually embark.

4. On receipt of either copy of the lists duly certified and signed as above explained, it will be the duty of the Government Emigration Agent at the Port of disembarkation, to pay over to the Emigrants the sums set opposite to their respective names, or to provide provisions and conveyance for them to their ultimate destination, in any case where such an appropriation is directed by the depositor.

Should any of the Emigrants desire not to receive until they reach their ultimate destination, the whole or any part of the money made payable to them on landing, the Agent will endeavour to make arrangements through the Local Banks to give effect to this wish.

In the absence of any specific directions from the depositor, the Agent will lay out the money for the benefit of the people in such manner as he may judge most to their immediate advantage.
