A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Hazen, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered the following Messages:—

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Message to the House of Assembly, 6th February, 1847.

W. M. G. COLEBROOKE, Lt. Gov.

The Lieutenant Governor lays before the Assembly, the copy of a Despatch he has received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in which are specified the amendments required in two Acts passed in the last Session of the Legislature, to Incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company, and to facilitate the making of a Railway from Saint John to the Boundary Line of Canada.

The Despatches accompanying this Message being read at the Clerk's Table, are as follow:—

RAILWAY COMPANY ACTS.

[No. 34.] Downing Street, 2d December, 1846.

SIR,—Her Majesty's Government have had under their consideration two Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and intituled respectively "An Act to incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company," and "An Act to facilitate the making of a Railway from the City of Saint John, through Fredericton and Woodstock, to the Grand Falls of the River Saint John, and from thence to the Boundary Line of the Province of Canada, by the New Brunswick Company."

I transmit for your information copies of a correspondence with the Agents of the Company in this country, which will put you in possession of the views of Her Majesty's Government with respect to these Acts; and as I consider the assurance given by the Agents, that the Directors will apply in the next Session of the Provincial Legislature for an Act embracing the several amendments specified in the Letter from this Office of the 26th ultimo, to be perfectly satisfactory, it is my intention to advise Her Majesty to confirm the Acts in question.

GENTLEMEN,—I am directed by Earl Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 12th instant, in which you request to be informed whether the two Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and intituled respectively "An Act to Incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company," and "An Act to facilitate the making of a Railway from the City of Saint John, through Fredericton and Woodstock, to the Grand Falls of the River Saint John, and from thence to the Boundary Line of the Province of Canada, by the New Brunswick Railway Company," have been confirmed by Her Majesty in Council.

Upon this subject I am directed to make to you the following observations:

1st. With respect to the provisions of the Act for incorporating the New Brunswick Company, relative to the conveyance of Troops, Her Majesty's Government are of opinion, that the proviso that the Company shall not be bound to start trains at other than the ordinary hours, will be found inconvenient, and that arrangements should be made for securing the conveyance of
