The following Address was presented to the Reverend JOHN DUNN, Rector of Douglas, a few days prior to his departure for the United States, where he intends to pass the Winter for the benefit of his health, which is in a precarious state.

Douglas, 28th September, 1847.

REVEREND AND DEAR SIR,

We, the Churchwardens and Vestry of Saint Mary's Church, and others of your Parishioners, take this opportunity to express our feelings of regret, that the state of your health should render it necessary that you should be removed from us for a season, and seek its restoration in a milder climate.

Your unremitting kindness, ardent zeal, and unwearied, faithful and affectionate discharge of your arduous Parochial duties, during a period of nearly four years, have, we believe, with the Divine blessing, been productive of much good to our most holy Church, excited in us the warmest feelings of respect, friendship, and esteem, and gained for yourself the good opinion of all classes in this Parish.

Assured that through an all-wise Providence our separation will not be of long continuance, and that your sojourn, during the approaching Winter, in a more genial climate, with a cessation from your arduous and fatiguing duties, will restore you to us with recruited strength, and in the full enjoyment of health, and trusting that the benefit expected by yourself may be equally participated in by your truly kind and hospitable Lady and zealous fellow-labourer, we remain, Dear Sir, Very respectfully yours.

To which the Reverend Gentleman replied as follows :—

GENTLEMEN,

In acknowledging the receipt of your Address of 28th September, I feel that something more than the expression of my sincere thanks is due to you, particularly as I am convinced from looking over the list of signatures which embraces only heads of families and regular attendants at Church, that your expressions are sincere, although I know your feelings have induced you to look much too favourably upon my poor services.

Your sincerity has been tested by your strong expression of dissent to my proposal to resign my charge, which proposition I wish to have perfectly understood originated in a sense of duty, and unwillingness to confine the Parish to the services of one so entirely unequal to their proper performance; and should I be permitted, through the mercy of the Divine disposer of all events, to return with renewed health, this late expression of friendly feeling towards me, added to the unbroken manifestation of its existence, during our connexion, by continued acts of considerate kindness, cannot fail to inspire me with renewed readiness and zeal in labouring for your spiritual welfare, and for the promotion among you, through the Divine blessing, of the fruits of a right faith, spiritual union, peace and good will.

After cautioning you against thinking too highly of my imperfect labours, I beg you will accept my most sincere thanks for the expression of your kindly feelings towards Mrs. Dunn, who unites with me in earnest prayers for your welfare, both temporally and spiritually, and I remain Your Pastor and faithful friend,
