A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it appears from an Inquest held before William Bayard, Esq., Coroner of our Lady the Queen for the City of Saint John, on the first day of February instant, on the body of a new born Female Child, then and there lying dead, that some person or persons unknown, did feloniously make an assault on the said child, being alive, and did then and there strike, bruise and beat the head of the said child, and did then and there thereby feloniously, wilfully, and of malice aforethought, cause the death of the said child:

I do therefore publish this Proclamation, and do hereby offer a Reward of Fifty Pounds to whomsoever shall give such information as may lead to apprehension and conviction of the Offender.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the fifteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty seven, and in the tenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

COAST OF NOVA SCOTIA.

Revolving Light on Beaver Island.

A Revolving Light has been established on the S. E. part of Beaver Island, on the Coast of Nova Scotia.

The Light revolves every two minutes, during which, it is visible one minute and a half, and invisible for the remaining half minute. It stands 70 feet above the sea, and may therefore be seen 15 miles.

The Light House is a rectangular white building, with two black balls on its seaward face; it stands in latitude 44° 48' North, and in longitude 62° 20' West of Greenwich, (or 1° 16' East of Sumbro Light.)

The Light bears from the outer Bird Ledge, W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. (Magn.) distant 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Light bears from Beaver Shelf, N. W. (Magn.) distant 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Light bears from Yankee Jack, E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. (Magn.) distant 8 miles.

Vessels intending to run for Beaver Harbour should give the Light House Island a berth of three quarters of a mile, to avoid a Reef which projects from it to the Eastward.

S. W. Light on St. Paul's Island.

A Bell has been added to the S. W. Light House on St. Paul's Island, which is tolled during the continuance of foggy weather.
