A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it appears by an Inquest held before Peter C. Amiraux and Vital Thibideau, Esquires, two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Carleton, on view of the body of Douglas Balloch, deceased, that the said Douglas Balloch came to his death by the discharge of a Gun, loaded with Gunpowder, a Lead Bullet, some Buck-shot and Duck-shot, on the night of the eleventh of October last, fired off by some person or persons unknown; I do therefore publish this Proclamation, and do hereby offer a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to whomsoever shall give such information to Her Majesty's Attorney General, of the person or persons by whom the offence was committed, as will enable him to prosecute the Offender or Offenders to conviction.

WHEREAS the Governor of Her Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, with the Council and Assembly of the said Province, did, in the months of March and April, 1847, pass two Acts, which have been transmitted, entitled as follows, viz:—

No. 1744. An Act to amend and extend the provisions of an Act, intituled An Act to Incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company.

No. 1750. An Act further to amend and extend the provisions of an Act, entitled An Act to Incorporate the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Company.

And whereas the said Acts have been referred to the Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, and the said Committee have reported as their opinion to Her Majesty, that the said Acts should be left to their operation; Her Majesty was thereupon this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve the said Report: Whereof the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, of Her Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Reply of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to the Communication of the Mayor and Common Council of Saint John, which was published in the last Gazette, (Nov. 17.) page 3545:—

SECRETARY'S OFFICE,
Fredericton, 20th November, 1847.

SIR,—I am directed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the — instant, transmitting certain Resolutions of the Common Council of the City of Saint John, in reference to the Emigrants landed from the *Aeolus*; and I have it in command to make the following observations in answer.

Your communication having been received immediately after the meeting of the Executive Council, which assembled at Fredericton on the 10th instant, His Excellency had no opportunity of advising with them on the subject, although the measures which it might be necessary for the Government to adopt in the exigency occasioned by the unlooked for arrival of a number of destitute and suffering Emigrants, at the close of the season, and after the period for breaking up the Quarantine establishment at Partridge Island, had engaged their anxious deliberations.

Throughout the season, as the Mayor and Common Council are fully aware, His Excellency, in repeated visits to Saint John, personally co-operated with the local authorities in measures for relieving the pressure upon the community; and in his correspondence with Her Majesty's Government, His Excellency has done full justice to the disposition manifested by the Mayor and Common Council to assist in alleviating the distress and sufferings of the Emigrants.

Admitting the inconvenience to the community of Saint John—and which has been also felt, in an equal degree, in other parts of the
