Sunday, 15th.—Running along the coast of Ireland, fine clear weather, Wind N. N. W., at noon passed Cape Clear, distance 300 miles.

Monday, 16th.—Fine clear weather and smooth sea, Wind N. N. E., lat. 51, 29, N., long. 17, 33, W., distance 293 miles.

Tuesday, 17th.—Fine clear weather and smooth sea, Wind S. S. W., lat. 51, 14, long. 25, 18, distance 293 miles.

Wednesday, 18th.—Fine clear weather and rough sea, Wind S. S. W., lat. 60, 59, long. 32, 46, distance 282 miles.

Thursday, 19th.—Fine clear weather and heavy swell from S. W., Wind N. W., lat. 49, 51, long. 39, 35, distance 269 miles.

Friday, 20th.—Heavy weather and moderate swell, Wind N. N. E., lat. 48, 51, long. 46, 25, distance 284 miles.

Saturday, 21st.—Foggy weather and smooth sea, Wind S., lat. 46, 21, long. 52, 49, distance 289 miles.

Sunday, 22d.—Foggy and rainy, smooth sea, Wind S. S. W. and S., lat. 45, 5, long. 59, 46, distance 302 miles, after part strong gale and heavy sea.

Monday, 23d.—Arrived at Cunard's wharf at 7 A. M. having been detained five hours off the Harbour, distance 172 miles.
