

most of his or her power, aid all Peace Officers in the maintenance of Peace, and in arresting and exposing any and every person who may be charged with any crime or offence, in case of such person so charged being in or about his or her premises; and every person who may be convicted of any offence against the provisions of this section, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay the like penalty as is prescribed in the first Section of this Law.

III. And be it enacted, That this Law shall come into operation and be in force from the publication thereof, and continue for one year and no longer.

Steam Explosion and Loss of Life.—On the 7th inst., the Steam Saw Mills of Messrs. Botsford & Ferguson, Pugwash, Cumberland, were partially destroyed by an explosion of one of the large boilers. The accident occurred just after the return of the men from dinner. The exploded boiler was thrown from its bed—one portion driven several hundred yards into the harbour—the other forced a considerable distance into a pile of deals on the wharf. The roof of the engine house was blown up, and the heavy tall chimney blown away, the bricks falling in every direction. A man named Michael M'Kenny, from New Brunswick, about 35 years of age, was killed instantly. Douglas, the fireman, is terribly scalded, and his life is despaired of. The engineer was seriously burnt, and others more or less.—*New Brunswick.*

At St. Catherine's Church, Abercromby Square, Liverpool, on the 26th July, Frederick Shortland, Esquire, Commander, R. N., formerly of Her Majesty's Surveying Steamer *Columbia*, to Emily, eldest daughter of Captain Thomas Jones, late of the 74th Regiment, and High Sheriff of the County of Charlotte, New-Brunswick.

Died.

On Tuesday morning last, Peter Fisher, Esq., one of the oldest inhabitants of this City, aged 65 years. He was born at Staten Island, in the then British Province of New-York. At the close of the Revolutionary war, in which his father and grandfather served with the Royalist army, his father landed upon the shores of this Province in company with the Loyalists. A kind and affectionate husband and father, his loss is deeply lamented by his family. Although a man of plain and unostentatious manners, those who knew him intimately are aware that his intellectual capacity, power of memory, and application, were alike great; from childhood to old age, notwithstanding he was generally engaged in active employments, he pursued a constant course of reading upon almost every subject, and had acquired an amount of information which is very rarely attained. The last few months of his life were marked by a constant regard to the duties of Religion, and during his last illness, his mind was entirely devoted to this subject. Deeply impressed with the conviction that he would not recover, he calmly committed himself into the hands of God, and in the eventide of his course, sank quietly to rest.

At Digby, N. S., on the 14th inst., after a short illness, resulting from inflammation of the Bronchiæ, the Rev. S. Bamford, known in these Provinces for the last forty two years, as a respectable and useful Minister of the Gospel in the Wesleyan Church. He was probably the last survivor of the heroes who, in June, 1794, sustained under Lord Howe, the naval honor of Britain. At the advanced age of 77 years, he laid aside "this mortal coil" in sure and certain hope of a joyful resurrection.—His remains were brought to Saint John, and interred on Thursday last.
