The following Presentment was made by the Grand Jury at the January Sessions of 1848 for the County of York:—

The Grand Inquest of the County of York have maturely considered the several matters brought under their notice in the Charge of His Honor the presiding Justice, and beg respectfully to present to the Court as follows:—

The Grand Jury regret to learn that any apathy has, at any time during the recess of the Court, been manifested by the inhabitants of this City in aiding the civil authorities in the maintenance of the public peace; but they feel well assured that the importance of maintaining the supremacy of the Laws, on which the well-being of society depends, is too deeply fixed in the minds of the community at large to give room for the smallest doubt that the Magistrates and Peace Officers will be supported in the discharge of their duty.

The Grand Inquest have visited the County Gaol and inspected the premises, accompanied by the High Sheriff of the County; and while they have to acknowledge the general comfort and cleanliness, yet some minor repairs and additional securities appear to be wanting. The state of the Bedding was particularly brought under their notice, and they have unanimously agreed to recommend the state of these and other supplies to the consideration of the Court.

The state of the Roads and Bridges was brought under the consideration of the Grand Inquest, by private representation as well as by the Charge of His Honor the presiding Justice, and the opinion is entertained by the Grand Jury that the state of the Bridges on the Great Road leading through the lower part of the Parish of Kingsclear and upper part of Fredericton, demands attention.

The state of the Markets has also occupied the attention of the Grand Jury, who are deeply impressed with the discredit which must ever attach to a community in which regular Markets are not established,—an inconvenience which is severely felt by the inhabitants of this City, and the farmers who have not extensive commercial and private relations, and tends greatly to encourage forestalling and other attendant evils.

The Grand Inquest also present to the Court the nuisance arising from the selling of dead meats in and about private premises, and the slaughtering of cattle in and in the immediate neighbourhood of the City,—in particular in a slaughter house erected on the southern line of Charlotte Street, in the continuation of Carleton Street, respecting which a complaint was lodged with them.

The Grand Inquest have personally visited the Taverns in the City, and on taking into serious consideration the points submitted to them in the Charge of His Honor the presiding Justice, have found it necessary to make several presentments. The subject however is intimately connected with the morals of the community; the Grand Jury, therefore, beg leave respectfully to record their opinion, that the most important points to be kept in view in granting Licences are, to restrict the number to the requirements of the public, and secure the accommodations for the travelling community, which the laws on the subject have determined, in addition to which is the obvious necessity that the Licencees should be men of good repute and sober habits.

All which is most respectfully submitted.
