At a Meeting of the City Council of the City of Fredericton, holden on the 8th day of July, A. D. 1848, the following Bye Law was read and enacted :—

#### A LAW

To levy a Tax on Dogs within the City of Fredericton.

**I. B**E it enacted by the City Council of the City of Fredericton, that there be laid and imposed the yearly tax or duty of Five Shillings on each and every Dog which shall or may be kept or owned by all persons residing within the following limits, that is to say: Beginning on the Southern Bank of the River Saint John at the upper Boundary of the said City ; thence southwesterly along the same until it strikes the prolongation of the rear line of the second range of Pasture Lots ; thence along the said prolongation and rear line until it strikes the Road leading to the lower Boundary of the said City ; thence East to the said River ; and thence up along the Bank of the same to the place of beginning ; which said tax or duty is hereby required to be paid by the owner or keeper of such Dog or Dogs, to such person or persons as the said City Council may for that purpose appoint and direct, within ten days after the same shall have been demanded, and in default thereof, the same shall and may be sued for, recovered and levied, in the manner provided in and by any Bye Law of the said Corporation, for the recovery of Fines, Penalties and Forfeitures, which now is or may hereafter be in force.

**II.** And be it enacted. That it shall be the duty of all persons residing within the abovementioned Limits, and who shall own or keep any Dog or Dogs, to affix a Collar on the neck of each and every such Dog, with the name of the owner or keeper plainly and legibly marked thereon ; and all Dogs owned by persons resident as aforesaid, found going at large without such name and Collar as aforesaid, shall be liable to be killed and destroyed by the person or persons appointed to collect the said tax, or by any Constable of the said City ; provided always, that in case the owner or keeper of such Dog or Dogs so found going at large contrary to the provisions of this Law, shall be known, such owner or keeper shall be liable to a penalty of Five Shillings, (in addition to the tax,) to be recovered as aforesaid.

**III.** And be it enacted, That this Law shall come into operation and be in force from the publication thereof, and continue for one year and no longer.

**THUNDER STORM.**—This City and its vicinity were visited by a very severe storm of thunder and lightning, accompanied by heavy rain, on Tuesday morning last. A post on the outer end of the South Market Wharf is stated to have been split by the electric fluid, and, at Frog Pond, about five miles from town, a cow was seriously injured by it. At Bellisle, King's County, it is stated that three head of cattle were killed and a barn set on fire by the lightning.

On the premises of Mr. William P. Flewelling, at Kingston, three cows were found dead within a rod of each other. It appears that a large old birch tree about eight rods from them, was completely shivered to pieces by the lightning, which separated from it in twelve different directions, (three of the tracks running directly towards the cows,) the ground being ploughed up like a furrow—stumps undermined, and the earth cleaved from rocks that were near the surface in the lightning's course. Many pieces of the tree were scattered to a distance of ten rods, and the ground about its roots was so completely shaken, (being somewhat wet,) that after the shock it would not bear the weight of a man to walk upon it.—*Saint John Courier.*
