TO THE PRESIDENT AND DIRECTORS OF THE B. N. A. ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH ASSOCIATION.

GENTLEMEN,-The confidence you have been pleased to place in me as your Superintendent and Secretary, has caused me to bestow attentive consideration to our present difficult position, with regard to crossing New Bronswick, and I feel it my duty respectfully to offer the following suggestions :---

That a General Meeting should be called for an early date, for the purpose of obtaining the permission of the present Shareholders, to dispose of new Stock on these terms :

" That we, the undersigned, do hereby promise to become liable for the following amounts, in order that the B. N. A. Electric Telegraph Line between Quebec and Halifax, be speedily completed, provided always, that the sum total of such amounts be £6500 currency, and provided also, that we do receive the interest of 6 per cent. per annum from the profits of said Line, when completed, before any premiums are paid on the original stock."

1 will now refer back a moment to the 5d. at present in favor of the Montreal public sending their communications to Boston, via Troy. It is very generally known that there are individuals in this town who are anxious and ready to increase the B. N.
