At Windsor, N. S., on Wednesday last, by the Rev. Alfred Gilpin, A. M., J. W. Weldon, Esquire, Q. C. and Speaker of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, to Susan, eldest daughter of the Hon. Mr. Justice Halliburton, of Clifton, Windsor.

Died.

At his residence, in this City, on the 26th instant, after a short but painful illness, which he bore with christian fortitude and resignation to the Divine will, Oliver Smith, Esquire, in the 50th year of his age. He was born in Readfield, Maine, U. S., and came to this Province in the early part of his life.—For many years prior to his death he engaged in mercantile business, which he prosecuted with more than ordinary success, and in which he became extensively known and highly estimated. The Funeral, from his residence in Waterloo Row, on the 27th instant, was very numerous and respectfully attended by sorrowing relatives and sympathising friends, whose remembrance of the deceased will not soon cease, and whose thoughts of him will be ever associated with thoughts of goodness and virtue. Mr. Smith was largely gifted with the nobler qualities of the understanding and the heart, characterized alike for superiority of intellect and general intelligence; his sobriety, correct deportment, and sterling integrity, were prominent in all his associations and business transactions; and by the generosity of his feelings, and urbanity of his manners, won for himself the confidence and esteem of all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. The community in which he lived has sustained a loss in his death which is universally regretted.

On Monday, Capt. Robert Wylie, aged 50 years.—Capt. W. was well known in this City and Fredericton, having commanded the New-Brunswick and St. John steamers. His loss will be deeply felt by his family and a large circle of friends and acquaintances.
