During the late floods in South Wales, the valley of the Towy was completely overflowed, and near Carmarthen boats regularly plied on the Pensarn and Tailwyd roads, for the purpose of conveying the farmers to market; while a gentleman was forced to leave his carriage, and cross the water in a Welsh coracle, made of willows covered with tarpauling.

Potatoes are now selling in North Nottinghamshire, by the Trent side, retail, at 10d. a peck; and whole-

sale at 13s. per 16 stone.

The net earnings of the prisoners in Milbank Penitentiary, during the year 1846, were £3,908 16s. $10\frac{1}{4}$ d;

being about £4 3s. 73d. per head.

The first public dinner of the Commercial Travellers' Schools Society, took place at the London Tavern on Monday evening. The Lord Mayor presided, and the guests numbered nearly 400. There are now 35 orphan children in the institution.

The tooops stationed in Ireland, at the beginning of the present month, amounted to 34,000 men of all arms.

The Emperor of Russia has presented to Mr. Nasmyth, of Patricroft, a very superb diamond ring, as a mark of his satisfaction with the working of two piledriving machines at Cronstadt, erected by Mr. Nasmyth.

For the last few weeks the mortality in London has not only been greater than it was during the presence of cholera in this country in 1831-2, but greater than it has been at any period since the great plague.

The Dutch Government, it is said, intends to open the ports of Surinam to the flags of all nations, thus renouncing, in this instance at least, its long maintained system of exclusion.—Globe.

The Admiralty has ordered a Brig-of-war to be fitted for the reception and training of boys entered as apprentices in the royal navy.
