NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury having been pleased to issue a Warrant, dated the 8th March, authorizing a reduction in the rates of Postage on Letters transmitted direct, by British Packets, between the United Kingdom and any part of British North America, under which Warrant, on and after the 15th April next, Letters forwarded from the United Kingdom to New Brunswick, and vice versa, will be chargeable with a uniform rate of 11½d. sterling, when not exceeding half an ounce in weight; a Letter weighing above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, will be liable to 1s. 11d., or two rates, and so on according to the scale at present in operation. The payment of this Postage will remain optional with the sender.

We deeply regret to learn that Captain John S. Shore, of the 24th Regiment, son of the Hon. George Shore, of this City, fell at the head of his Company in the late engagement with the Sikhs, in the East Indies. When the news of this battle reached this City, on Saturday morning last, it was ascertained that eleven Officers belonging to the 24th were killed, and as there were no names given, the greatest anxiety was felt for the fate of Captain Shore and Lieutenant Baillie, son of the Hon. the Surveyor General, who were both serving in that Corps. On Sunday the Letter Mail brought intelligence of the safety of the latter, and of the melancholy, although honorable, death of Captain Shore. We are sure that we only express the unanimous feeling in this community when we say that they deeply sympathise with the family who have sustained this sudden bereavement, and that the regret for the loss of this gallant and accomplished young Officer is participated in by all who knew him.—H.
