**THE LATE DR. ALLAN.**—It becomes our painful duty to record in this day's impression the decease of Colin Allan, Esq., M. D., one of the most respectable and most respected inhabitants of this City. The melancholy event took place at the residence of the deceased in King Street, yesterday morning at two o'clock, after a protracted and painful illness, which he bore with exemplary fortitude and resignation. We are far from wishing to speak in language of eulogy of the character of the deceased, but having been honored with Dr. Allan's acquaintance, (we had almost ventured to say friendship) for the last fourteen years, we may be pardoned for saying that a man of no ordinary mind has been taken from our midst. Dr. Allan was a native of the City of Aberdeen, Scotland, and entered the army as a medical officer at an early age. After a long period of foreign service he was promoted to the rank of principal medical officer at Halifax, and deputy inspector of military hospitals in the Nova Scotia command. During the time Dr. Allan held this honorable appointment, the Cholera raged with fearful violence in Halifax, and we have heard more than one of his professional brethren bear testimony to the admirable manner in which he discharged his duty during that trying crisis. His humanity, his devotion to his profession, and his utter disregard of personal danger or inconvenience during the prevalence of the scourge, placed his character in its true light. In 1835 Dr. Allan retired on half pay, and has since that period been an inhabitant of this City, where he has left a monument of his independence of character in opening up Charlotte Street, which will be remembered while the records of the City remain. Although Dr. Allan never practised his profession in this City, yet many a poor person has had the benefit of his friendly hints for the preservation or restoration of their health, and these hints were not unfrequently backed with the means of rendering them available. Possessing a large fund of varied literary attainments, Dr. Allan had also an extensive knowledge of the world, and these, coupled with his goodness of heart and cheerfulness of disposition, endeared him to his friends, who have the satisfaction of knowing that he has left to his family that best inheritance—"an unsullied name."

The remains of Dr. Allan were accompanied to their resting place in the Church-yard of this City, at 4 o'clock this afternoon, by a train of mourners and friends. The funeral was a private one, but few better deserved being buried with military honors.—*Head Quarters.*

#### Died,

At his residence in King Street, on the morning of the 16th instant, Colin Allan, Esq., M. D., aged 77 years. Dr. Allan was a native of Aberdeen Scotland.

At Saint John, on Friday morning, after a short illness, Mr. Charles B. Simpson, a native of Aberdeen, in the 40th year of his age.—Mr. Simpson was, for a period of eight years, clerk in the store of Mr. Thomas R. Gordon, Hardware Merchant, Market Square,—was much esteemed by his employer, and by an extensive circle of acquaintances in the community.
