A PROCLAMATION.

EDMUND HEAD.

THEREAS War has been declared by Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria against the Emperor of all the Russias, I do hereby order and direct that Wednesday the thirty first day of May now instant, be kept and observed throughout the Province of New Brunswick as a day of humiliation and solemn prayer to Almighty God for the success of Her Majesty's Arms, the prosperity of the British Empire, and a safe and lasting Peace.

> Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the twelfth day of May, in the year of our brethren, &c. Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty four, and in the seventeenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

A FORNE OF PEANER

Prepared by His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton, To be used in all

Churches and Chapels of the Church of England Throughout the Province of New Brunswick, On Wednesday, May 31st, 1854,

Being the day appointed by Proclamation of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to be observed as a Day of Humiliation and Prayer for the success of Her Majesty's Arms in the present War, and for a safe and lasting Peace.

THE ORDER FOR MORNING PRAYER.

The Service shall be the same, with the usual Morning Prayer, save where it is in this Office otherwise appointed.

The Minister shall read with a loud voice this sentence of Holy Scripture-

Rend your heart, and not your garments, and turn unto the Lord your God: for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repenteth him of the

¶ Instead of the Collect for the day, the following shall be used—
