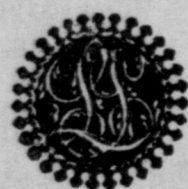

## A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

**W**HEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us and Our Allies and His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias was concluded at Paris on the Thirtieth Day of March last, and the Ratifications thereof have now been duly exchanged: In conformity thereunto, we have thought fit hereby to command that the same be published throughout all Our Dominions: And We do declare to all Our loving Subjects Our Will and Pleasure, that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as by Land, and in all Places whatsoever, strictly charging and commanding all Our loving Subjects to take notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twenty-eighth Day of April, in the Year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the Nineteenth Year of Our Reign.

## A PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed in the eighteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act relating to the Post Office," it is provided that as soon as it shall be deemed advantageous to the public service that the Office of Postmaster General should be political, the Governor in Council shall, by Proclamation, declare the time when the said Act shall come into force;—

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority vested in me by the said Act, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Act shall come into force on this day.
