## PROVINCIAL BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

To the Farmers of New Brunswick.

THERE exists in the United States just now, a grievous murrain or contagious distemper among horned cattle.

It chi fly attacks the lungs, which it slowly but certainly destroys. It is said to be highly contagious, and exposure to the breath or the touch of a diseased animal, seems to bring certain death with it.

This murrain has been known on the Continent of Europe for some time, but has only recently been introduced into Massachusetts, with cattle imported from Holland. It has been propagated from thence into the adjoining States, and a case is said to have occurred in the Town of Wells, in Maine.

Commissioners have been appointed to watch the progress of the disease, and to destroy infected animals. A special Session of the Legislature of Massachusetts has even been convened, with a view to further precautions.

No cases are as yet reported in any of the British Provinces, but paper we may expect to hear of them, and it is of the highest concern to us that it should not be introduced into New Brunswick.
