WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday the fifth day of September next, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday the tenth day of October next.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 25, 1861.

WITH reference to the General Orders of the 11th July, 28th August, and 11th September, His Excellency has been pleased to direct that the Competitors for "The Prince of Wales' Challenge Cup," will assemble for inspection at "The Firing Ground," Sussex Vale, at half-past ten o'clock *precisely*, on the 2nd October, entering by the Roadside Gate, where an Orderly Sergeant will be in attendance to receive the *Certificates* of the Officers commanding their respective Companies.

The Regulations under which the Firing is to be conducted will be read out to the Competitors on the Parade Ground.

The Competitors for "The Prince's Cup" will assemble at the same time and place on each succeeding day, until the successful Competitor is declared; and those for the Prize offered for competition to the Volunteer Militia Forces of Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and New Brunswick, (a Silver Urn, valued at \$250,) will assemble at the same hour and place on each succeeding day, until the successful Competitor is declared.

2. Further Orders, having reference to the safety of the Spectators, will be issued and circulated at Sussex Vale, on Monday the 1st October.

3. His Excellency desires the Officers commanding Companies of Militia volunteering for Drill and Exercise, to take particular care that no Rifles other than those issued to the Competitors for His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales' Cup, be taken from the Armories or from the Districts in which their respective Companies were enrolled, during the days fixed for the firing.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.—ROMAN ROCK LIGHT, FALSE BAY, CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

The bearings are by Compass and the distances in Nautical Miles.

Notice is hereby given, That a light will be exhibited from the new Light-house on the Roman Rocks, on the 16th September next, which will supersede that shown at the light-vessel now moored a cable's length north of the rocks. It will be a *revolving white* light, showing a bright face for the space of twelve seconds *twice* every minute, which will serve to distinguish it from the Cape Point Light in thick weather, as that light revolves only *once* every minute. The light will be fifty four feet above the sea, and visible in clear weather from a ship's deck thirteen miles distant.
