To His Excellency The Honorable Arthur Hamilton Gordon, C.M.G., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

May it please Your Excellency,

We, the undersigned, inhabitants of King's County, beg leave to tender to Your Excellency our dutiful respect and hearty welcome on this your first visit to this section of the Province.

We embrace this opportunity of expressing our devoted

loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's Person and Government.

We have not been indifferent spectators of those events which have deeply affected the domestic happiness of the Royal Family; but our feelings have been altogether in unison with the heartfelt sympathy which produced that unanimous outburst of National congratulation on the auspicious Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

Sensible of the manifold blessings of Peace which are enjoyed by the subjects of our hereditary Sovereign, we are led to deplore the calamities consequent upon the discord and internecine strife which have succeeded the last election of the Chief Magistrate of the United States, and caused the disruption of that Republic; and we find in the contrast, abundant reason for thankfulness on account of our happier lot in enjoying more stable Institutions.

Regarding Your Excellency as the Representative of our beloved Queen, we hail your arrival among us as a pleasing evidence of your wish to become acquainted with our local wants, and of a desire to promote such measures as may conduce to the prosperity and well-being of the Province over which Her Majesty has called you to reside; and we desire to express our implicit confidence in the wisdom and prudence of Your Excellency's Administration.

In conclusion, we hope that your visit to King's County will be satisfactory, and beg to offer our best wishes for Your Excellency's health and happiness.

REPLY.

Mr. High Sheriff, and Gentlemen,

I thank you for the Address with which you have welcomed my arrival at the Shire Town of this County.

As the Queen's Representative in this Province, it is highly gratifying to me to receive your assurances of loyal devotion to Her Majesty's Person and Throne; but I have witnessed the expression of these feelings without surprise, for I believe them universally to prevail in every corner of the Province.

I rejoice to learn that you are fully sensible of the manifold blessings which, as British subjects, you enjoy. Peace—light taxation—and the shelter of England's power, are ours,—and they indeed afford us ample cause for abundant thankfulness.

I have traversed your County with peculiar pleasure; and the aspect of its numerous and manifestly thriving settlements has afforded me the liveliest satisfaction.

The prosperity which you appear to enjoy is no doubt in a measure due to the natural advantages of the soil, but it must also be the work of your own industry and sagacity; whilst the fact that you have for the most part steadily devoted yourselves to agricultural occupations to the exclusion of pursuits of a more speculative character, must, in my opinion, have contributed largely to the attainment of this result.

I would, however, venture to recommend you to direct some attention to the mineral resources of the district. If apparent indications may be trusted, these resources amply merit such attention on your part, and would not leave their development by you unrewarded.

I heartily thank you for your good wishes towards myself personally. The people of this Province have everywhere welcomed me in the most kindly spirit. I trust I may not forfeit the good-will which they have so readily bestowed.
