Under Act 25th Victoria, Chapter 28.

THESE are to Certify, That William K. Reynolds, I. & F. Burpee, C. G. Berryman, Charles R. Ray, Frederic E. Barker, Richard Thompson, Charles A. Bovey, Alexander Jardine, George Eaton, and E. & H. Broad, all of the City of Saint John, in the City and County of Saint John, and Province of New Brunswick, have this day filed in my Office a Memorandum of Association for the incorporation of a Company to be styled the "*Lepreaux Manufacturing Company*," for the purpose of manufacturing Shovels and Hoes, and Farming utensils generally, and such other things as are incident to the attainment of that object, with a Capital of Forty thousand dollars, to be divided into two thousand shares of twenty dollars each; and stating that the Office or principal place of business of the said Company will be established at Lepreaux, in the County of Charlotte, and Province aforesaid.

HIS Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to accept the resignation of the appointment held by Lieutenant Colonel the Honorable John Robertson, as Commanding Officer of the Saint John Volunteer Battalion.

It is with extreme regret that His Excellency the Commander in Chief accepts this resignation, but he feels that he has no right to expect Lieutenant Colonel Robertson to continue longer to devote his time and energies to duties which he undertook in the first instance, on the distinct understanding that they were to be of a temporary character. His Excellency's warmest thanks are due to Lieutenant Colonel Robertson for the zeal and efficiency which he has uniformly shown; and by his retirement, the Saint John Battalion loses a Commanding Officer who cannot easily be replaced.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that all requisitions made by Militia Officers to the Adjutant General's Office, be sent through the Adjutant of the Battalion to which they belong.

It is impossible for the Adjutant General of Militia to open an account with individuals, and after this date all articles supplied to the Battalion will be debited to the Adjutant.

This Order does not apply to Officers commanding Volunteer Corps.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief directs that no Drill Instructor be employed except those paid by the Province, without especial permission from the Adjutant General; and His Excellency wishes it to be understood that the act of drilling a body of men without authority is punishable by law.

No. 34.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to cancel the Order in last Gazette, No. 30, relative to the date of the Rifle Competition at Mount Fordham, and to direct that the firing shall commence on Wednesday the 5th October, at 10 A. M.

Competitors will parade at the Camp, Mount Fordham, near Fredericton, on the above date, at 9.30 A. M.

Names of the intending Competitors to be sent into the Adjutant's Office on or before the 28th instant.

His Excellency has also the satisfaction of informing the Volunteers, that the National Rifle Association of Great Britain has forwarded a Silver Medal to be competed for by the Volunteers of this Province. It will be competed for at the same time and place as His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales' Cup.

The Rules will be as follows:—

Each Volunteer Company in the Province may send one Competitor; but where the Company exceeds fifty effective members, two may be sent. The Competitors must have been effective members at least three months previous to the nomination, which will be made by the Officer commanding the Company.

Each Company sending Competitors to subscribe one dollar for each.

Those entering for this Prize may either be Competitors for other prizes or not.
