WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Tuesday the fourteenth day of June instant, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday the twenty first day of July next.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty four, and in the twenty seventh year of Her Majesty's Reign.

FISHERY REGULATIONS.

Amendment passed in Council July 9th, 1864.

RULE No. 8 of the General Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Act 26 Victoria, Chapter 6, Section 4, intituled "An Act relating to the Coast and River Fisheries," is repealed, and in lieu thereof the following is made and adopted, viz:—

On the Rivers, Coast and Bays of the Counties of Gloucester, Northumberland, and Kent, no trap or engine shall be erected or set within two miles of the mouth of any River, Bay, or Inlet, nor in any water of less depth than three fathoms; nor shall any leading net be permitted to be attached thereto of a greater length than one hundred fathoms, nor with meshes of less than three inches measured from knot to knot; nor shall any leading net extend into shallower water than two fathoms, under a penalty for each and every offence of forty dollars, and for every day they are continued set or erected five dollars.

Downing Street, 20th June, 1864.

I have been informed by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that Medical Director General of the Navy has given it as his opinion that the Instructions in question are valuable, and that they have been circulated in the Royal Navy. I have, therefore, no hesitation in giving to these Instructions the circulation desired by the Committee of the Institution.

Royal National Life Boat Institution,

SIR,—I am directed to transmit to you a few copies of the new Instructions issued by the Royal National Life Boat Institution for the Restoration of the Apparently Drowned.

These Instructions are the result of extensive inquiries which have recently been made by the Institution amongst medical men, medical bodies, and Coroners, throughout the United Kingdom.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have ordered 1,000 copies to be circulated throughout Her Majesty's Fleet, and the Commodore Controller-General of Coast Guard has also requested 2,000 copies to be supplied for distribution throughout the Coast Guard service.

The Committee are desirous that these directions should be known throughout the British Colonies, and they would therefore feel much obliged if you would do them the honor to direct that the accompanying letters, containing packets of the same, be transmitted to the respective Governors of the Colonies.

Directions for restoring the apparently Drowned.

The leading principles of the following directions for the Restoration of the apparently Dead from Drowning are founded on those of the late Dr. Marshall Hall, combined with those of Dr. H. R. Silvester, and are the result of extensive inquiries which were made by the Institution in 1863–1864 amongst Medical men, Medical Bodies, and Coroners, throughout the United Kingdom. These Directions have been extensively circulated by the Institution throughout the United Kingdom and in the Colonies. They are
