Mr. Kerr, from the Committee appointed in Hilary Term last to enquire into the state of the Bye Laws of the Society, and report thereon, submit Rules prepared by the Committee, and read them; whereupon

On motion of Mr. Peters, the said Rules were taken up section by section, and agreed to with some alterations.

Which Rules, so adopted, are as follows :—

## BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS

## OF THE

## BARRISTERS' SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK,

Made under the authority of the Acts 9th Victoria, Chapter 48, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick," and 22nd Victoria, Chapter 28, in relation thereto.

1. By the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick, sanctioned by the Judges of the Supreme Court of this Province, *It is Ordained*, that the By-Laws and Regulations of this Society, hitherto in force or use, excepting so far as may affect anything heretofore done under the same, or any right acquired thereby, are hereby repealed.

2. All members of the Bar of New Brunswick, who have heretofore signified their assent, in writing, to the Secretary of the said Society, by respectively signing their names on a Roll, hitherto used for that purpose, and all other members of the said Bar, who may hereafter signify their assent as aforesaid by signing the said Roll, or by writing to the Secretary of the said Society, authorizing him to sign the name of such member to such Roll, and which writing the said Secretary shall keep, and file, and sign the Roll accordingly, shall be deemed members of the Barristers' Society, and be subject to the By-Laws and Regulations thereof.

3. The Chief Justice, for the time being, shall be Patron of the Society.

4. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Librarian, and Secretary, to be elected annually

by ballot, at a General Meeting, to be holden on the first Friday in Hilary Term, in each year, in the Law Library Room, at such hour as may be appointed. A General Meeting of the Society shall also be holden on the first Friday of each Term respectively, at such hour as may be appointed by the Council.

5. Special Meetings for the transaction of ordinary business may also be called in Term Time, on notice posted up in the Library Room, by the Secretary, at least forty eight hours previous to such meetings.

6. There shall be a Council, to be composed of the President, Vice-President, and seven Barristers, to be elected annually at the General Meeting as aforesaid. The Judges of the Supreme Court and Court of Admiralty, being members of this Society, shall be honorary members of the Council. Three members shall be a quorum.

7. The Council may, at any time, call a Special Meeting for social or complimentary purposes, giving as ample a notice of the time, place, and purposes, through the newspapers, and otherwise, as circumstances will permit. Such Meeting, however, not in any case to affect the rights and interests of individual members, nor the funds of the Society. If a member of the Society apply to the Council to call a Special Meeting, for the above mentioned purposes, and the Council refuse, then, any ten members of the Society, under the limits above stated, may call such Meeting, the notice thereof being in writing—published as aforesaid—stating the purpose, with time and place of meeting, and bearing the signatures of such ten members respectively.

8. No By-Law of this Society shall be passed or altered except at a General Meeting consisting of thirteen members, a majority whereof shall concur in such new law or alteration—nor unless notice in writing of the proposed law or alteration, shall be given and posted up in the Library Room, at a General Meeting in Term Time, immediately previous to the Term at which such proposed alteration is offered.

9. The Council shall have the general management of the affairs of the Society, and may, on due notice, with time and place of meeting, settle all questions between members relative to their *practice*; and regulate all other matters which can come under the cognizance of this Society, or may refer the same to the Court; but an appeal shall in all cases be allowed from the Council to the next General Meeting; a notice of such appeal to be given to the Secretary within twenty days after notice of the decision.

10. A member complaining of any infringement of the Rules or By-Laws of the Society, or of any conduct of another member, shall inform the Council in writing of the nature of his complaint, and the Council shall thereupon, after having given at least twenty days previous notice to the person complained of, of the time and place of meeting, together with a copy of such complaint, make such decision thereon as they may deem right, and may also report their proceedings to the Court if they deem it necessary so to do.

11. It shall be the duty of the President—and, in his absence, of the Vice-President, to enquire into the regularity of every admission to the office of Barrister or Attorney, and to guard against and oppose, in the name of the Society, every irregular or improper admission, and to advance such objections, in every case, as may be thought expedient or necessary for the honor or credit of the Profession, and to act as Counsel for the Society on all occasions before the Court.

12. There shall be annually devoted to the Law Library, for the purchase of books, as much money as can be spared from the funds of the Society.

13. The Council shall have the general management of the Law Library.

14. The Librarian shall have, under the direction of the Council, the superintendence of the books and of the room.

15. No books shall be removed from the Law Library for any reason whatsoever, except to the room where the Court is sitting, or to the Judges' Chambers in the same building, under a fine of one pound for the first offence, and a fine of five shillings for every day of its detention; and a fine of two pounds for every subsequent offence, and a fine of ten shillings for every day's detention; and in case the book is not returned within ten days, such member or Attorney shall be liable to pay to the Society, in addition to the foregoing fines, the value of the whole set, estimated according to the cost of the importation. When the set is replaced he shall be entitled to the odd volumes.

16. It shall be the duty of every office bearer, and each member of the Society, more especially of the Librarian, to guard the books from being taken from the Library,—to inform the Society, the President, or Vice-President thereof, the Council, or Treasurer, and to prosecute and give evidence of any breach of the foregoing fifteenth rule. Neither the Librarian, or any other office bearer, shall give consent in any way, to the loaning, removing or taking of any book or books from the Library for any cause whatever. And it shall be deemed a dishonorable breach of the rule, for any member or other person to take away a book from the Library upon any pretext whatever.

17. The Librarian shall be responsible for the keeping of the books at all times, in the Library: and it shall be his duty to examine, from time to time, if any book or books be absent from the Library. It shall be also his duty to report to the Council, President, or Vice-President of the Society, on the first day of each Term, if any book or books be missing from the Library, and endeavour to discover without delay, the person who may have taken or removed such book or books, and report his or their names to the Council or President of the Society, with his reason why he has not prosecuted the offender. And the said Librarian shall be liable to have deducted from his salary, the
