WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday the nineteenth instant, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday the thirtieth day of September next.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the eighteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and in the thirty third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

ADDRESS

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

Previous to the Levee held at Government House this day, the Mayor and Aldermen of this City presented His Excellency the Governor General with the following Address:—

To His Excellency The Right Honorable Sir JOHN YOUNG, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor General of Canada.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, have much pleasure in bidding Your Excellency a most cordial and hearty welcome upon this your first visit to our City.

We beg to assure Your Excellency that the Citizens of Fredericton, always noted for loyalty to our Sovereign, continue to delight in their connection with the British Empire, and are much gratified with the early visit which Your Excellency, as the Representative of our Gracious Queen, and the Head of the Government of this Dominion, has been pleased to make to the Capital of New Brunswick.

We feel that the recent changes which have been made in our Constitution, and the unsettled state of the public mind necessarily resulting therefrom, will call for great administrative ability in the management of the affairs of this Dominion; and from Your Excellency's great experience in the past, we can assure Your Excellency of our confidence that so long as you shall continue to hold your present dignified position, your best efforts will be given to the

administration of the Government now in your charge, and we trust with happy results.

PARISH SCHOOLS IN SACKVILLE.

FROM and after the first day of next October, the minimum average daily attendance of pupils, that is, of pupils of six years of age and upwards, at each and every School in UPPER SACKVILLE or the village of Sackville, extending from one mile below the Academy to one mile above the "Four-corners," so called, or a mile above Kinnear's Corner, in the County of Westmorland, must be at least seventeen, to entitle the Teachers of such Schools to the Provincial allowance.
