And I have further thought fit to order and direct, that Writs for calling a new General Assembly be forthwith issued in due form, returnable on Thursday the fourteenth day of July next.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a certain Act made and passed at the last Session of the Legislature of this Province, intituled "An Act to remove the Shire Town of King's County to a more convenient locality," authority was given to the Lieutenant Governor of this Province to select a convenient site in the vicinity of the line of the European and North American Railway, in the County of King's County, at or near which the Public Buildings for the said County, thereafter mentioned, should be erected, and to declare by Proclamation in the Royal Gazette the place so selected:

And whereas I have examined several localities in the said County, and duly considered the advantages of each, and have determined upon a site, which in my opinion will be most convenient for the inhabitants of the said County generally:

Now, therefore, I do hereby proclaim and declare that, under and by virtue of the authority aforesaid, I have selected the following site near the Ossekeag Station of the European and North American Railway, in the Parish of Hampton, in the said County, that is to say:—A certain Lot of Land lying southeast of the said Ossekeag Station, in the said Parish of Hampton, and southeast of a road on the top of the hill in rear of Barnes' Tannery, and northeast

of a road leading to Woodpecker Hall, which said land is said to belong to one Everitt.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in the thirty third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

UNITED STATES—MASSACHUSETTS.

Alteration in Tarpaulin Cove Light.

The United States Government has given Notice, that from the 9th day of April 1870, the following alteration would take place in the Light at Tarpaulin Cove, Vineyard Sound, viz:—

The fixed light would be changed to a *fixed and flashing* light, showing a flash every thirty seconds.

Lighthouse on Machias Islands.

The Canadian Government has given Notice, that a new Light-house has been erected to replace the Eastern Lighthouse on Machias Islands.

The new Lighthouse is 58 feet high, octagonal in shape, and painted white; it is 57 yards from the Western Lighthouse on the same bearing as before.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

WEST INDIES—HONDURAS.

Alteration in position of Light at Belize.

Information has been received, that the Light which was exhibited from Fort George, is now hoisted on the flagstaff at the Custom House.

Also, that the Shoal off Robinson Point now extends nearly half a mile to the northward of the Point.
