

PUBLIC SALE.

TO be sold at PUBLIC AUCTION, on THURSDAY the twenty first day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, at Chubb's Corner, (so called,) Prince William Street, in the City of Saint John, pursuant to a Decretal Order of the Supreme Court in Equity, made in a certain cause wherein Emma L. Frost, and Isaac C. Frost, by Mary C. Frost, their next friend, for and on behalf of themselves and other Creditors of William Wright, (deceased,) who shall come in and contribute to the expense of the said suit, are *Plaintiffs*; and Eliza Wright and William M. Wright, Executors of the last Will and Testament of William Wright, (deceased,) are *Defendants*; under the direction and with the approbation of the undersigned, one of the Barristers of the said Court, the Lands and Premises hereinafter described, that is to say—

1. All that certain lot, piece or parcel of LAND situate, lying and being in the Londonderry Settlement, so called, in the Parish of Hammond, formerly Upham, in King's County, in the Province of New Brunswick, known and distinguished in the Grant thereof, under the Great Seal of the said Province, to the said William Wright, as Lots Numbers Ten (10) and Twelve (12), and bounded as follows, to wit:—"Beginning at a beech tree standing on the northwest angle of Lot number fourteen (14), in Londonderry, granted to James Adams; thence running by the magnet east forty nine chains to the west side of a reserved road; thence north forty chains; thence west forty nine chains to a birch tree; and thence south forty chains to the place of beginning; containing two hundred acres more or less, distinguished as Lots Numbers Ten (10) and Twelve (12), in Londonderry as above mentioned."

All that certain Lot of LAND and Premises situate in the Parish of Saint Martins, in the County of Saint John, and Province of New Brunswick, being a part of certain lands conveyed to William Wright, deceased, by one George Smith, by Deed dated the twenty ninth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty three, and bounded and described as follows:—"Beginning at a post set where the westerly side of the Church and Mill Road (so called) intersects the easterly line of land belonging to John Campbell; thence along the said last mentioned line northerly forty chains and twenty eight links to another post there placed; thence south eighty nine degrees fifteen minutes east five chains and seventy two links to the road aforesaid, and crossing the same to the southern line of Curry's Road, so called; thence in a southeasterly course, following the said Curry's Road, twenty two chains and ninety eight links to the westerly line of land owned by James Curry; thence along the same south four degrees west eighteen chains and seventy seven links to a post there placed; thence south sixty four degrees forty five minutes west twenty four chains and thirty three links to the Church and Mill Road aforesaid; thence crossing the same to the westerly side thereof, and following the same in a southwesterly direction to the place of beginning; containing seventy four and one half acres, more or less," the same having been lately in occupation of one John Johnston.

All that certain Lot of LAND and Premises situate in the Parish of Saint Martins, in the County of Saint John, being a part of certain Lands conveyed to William Wright, deceased, by one George Smith, by deed dated the twenty ninth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty three, known as the south or upper lot, and bounded and described as follows:—"Beginning at a post set where the northern line of land belonging to John F. Godard meets the eastern line of land belonging to John Campbell; thence in a northerly course along the said Campbell's line fourteen chains to another post set on the southern side of the Church and Mill Road (so called); thence northeasterly following the course of the said road seventeen chains and six links; thence north sixty four degrees and forty five minutes east twenty four chains and thirty three links to another post at the western line of lands owned by Thomas Armstrong; thence south four degrees west along the last mentioned line forty one chains and sixteen links to a post set at the point of intersection of the respective lines of the said Thomas Armstrong and the said John F. Godard; and thence along the said Godard's line north eighty six degrees west twenty eight chains and eighty nine links to the place of begin-

PRIVATE AND LOCAL BILLS.

THE following Rules were adopted by both Houses of the Legislature at the Session of 1864:—

"That no Bill of a private or local nature, or Bill for making any amendments of a like nature to any former Act, shall be received by the House, unless a notice, specifying the several objects desired to be attained, has been published four successive weeks, previous to the meeting of the Legislature, or to the introduction of the Bill, in some one of the Newspapers published in the City or County interested in the measure, or in the locality where the parties affected reside; and when no Newspaper is published in either of such localities, then in some Newspaper published in the nearest adjoining County, or in the Royal Gazette.

"That separate Petitions be presented to each Branch of the Legislature, setting forth in detail the object of the measure, and the reasons that may be urged for its adoption.

"It shall be the duty of all parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local Bill, to file with the Clerk of each House the evidence of their having complied with the Rules and Standing Orders thereof; and that in default of such proof being so furnished, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to report that the Rules and Standing Orders have not been complied with, and to endorse the same upon the Bill.

"That the foregoing Rules be published in the Royal Gazette, over the signature of the Clerk of each House, weekly, during each recess of the Legislature."
