A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act made and passed in the thirty sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to divide the County of Victoria into two Counties, and provide for the government of the new County," it was

amongst other things enacted that the said new County should not be deemed to be erected and established until the same should be notified by Proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, such Proclamation to be made not later than the first day of January eighteen hundred and seventy four;—

And whereas I have this day determined to issue my Proclamation, in pursuance of the power given me in that behalf in the said Act;—

NOW THEREFORE I do hereby, in and by virtue of the said Act of Assembly, proclaim and declare that all that part of the County of Victoria lying to the northward of a line commencing where the boundary line between this Province and the State of Maine strikes the southwestern bank or shore of the River Saint John; thence in a direct line northeasterly across the said River to the upper line of lot number one hundred and sixty six, granted to L. R. Coombes; thence along the said upper line of said lot number one hundred and sixty six to its rear; and thence north forty five degrees east till it strikes the County of Restigouche, is and from henceforth shall be erected and established into a new County, separate and distinct from the County of Victoria, and shall be called and known by the name of THE COUNTY OF MADAWASKA.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the thirty first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy three, and in the thirty seventh year of Her Majesty's Reign.
