GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

TO AUCTIONEERS.

THE attention of all AUCTIONEERS is again called to the following Sections of Chapter 94 of The Consolidated Statutes, page 740; and they are required to govern themselves accordingly:—

"4. Every Auctioneer who shall not within thirty days from the end of every three months render to the Receiver General an Account in writing on Oath (B) as in the Schedule hereto, of all Auction Sales by him, and pay the duties thereon to such Officer, shall for each omission be liable to a penalty of two hundred dollars. The Oath provided in this Section may be administered by any Justice of the Peace of the County where the party attending may reside.

"5. The Receiver General shall require such Accounts to be regularly furnished, and proceedings to be instituted if neglected and shall keep a book of Entries of all moneys received for Auction duties."

THE attention of all Persons concerned is called to the following Section of Chapter 9 of The Consolidated Statutes, page 150; and they are required to govern themselves accordingly:—

"All Accounts connected with the Receipt and Expenditure of Public Moneys shall be rendered at the Office of the Auditor General, or other Officer whose duty it shall be to examine and report on Public Accounts, on or before the Fifteenth day of November in each year; and every Public Officer neglecting to render his Accounts within the time limited, shall be deemed incapable of being appointed to receive or expend public moneys for the following year."

Downing Street, 29th December, 1880.

SIR,—With reference to my predecessor's Circular Despatch of the 24th December, 1879, I have the honor to transmit to you for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of an Order in Council dated the 16th of December, giving effect to a Convention between this Country and Switzerland, which was signed at Berne on the 11th of December, further prolonging the duration of the Treaty of the 31st March 1874, for the Mutual Surrender of Fugitive Criminals.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts of 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the thirty first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy four, between Her Majesty and the Swiss Confederation, for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Swiss Confederation, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within their respective
