PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Royal Proclamation dated at Windsor Castle on the twenty second day of May one thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, Her Most Gracious Majesty did ordain, declare and command that on and after the first day of July then next the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, should form and become a Dominion, under the name of Canada;

And whereas the Anniversary of the formation of the Dominion of Canada falls upon WEDNESDAY the first day of July next ensuing, and it is meet and proper the said Anniversary should be observed and kept;

Now KNOW YE, that I do hereby proclaim and appoint WEDNESDAY the first day of July next, a General Holiday, and I do hereby enjoin and call upon all Her Majesty's loving subjects throughout the Province to join in the due and proper celebration and observance of the said Anniversary.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the seventeenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one one thousand eight hundred and eighty five, and in the forty eighth year of Her Majesty's Reign.
