WE, therefore, considering that these blessings enjoyed by Our people throughout the said Dominion do call for a solemn and public acknowledgement, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, to

appoint, and We do appoint Thursday, the sixth day of November next, as a day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed this year; and We do invite all Our loving subjects throughout Canada to observe the said day as a day of General Thanksgiving.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. WITNESS, Our Right Trusty and Well-Beloved the Right Honorable Sir FREDERICK ARTHUR STANLEY, Baron Stanley of Preston, in the County of Lancaster, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor General of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this TWENTIETH day of SEPTEMBER, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety, and in the Fifty-fourth year of Our Reign.

TIMBER LICENSES.

CROWN LAND OFFICE, 15th Oct., 1890.

THE attention of Licensees of Crown Lands, for the purpose of cutting Lumber, is called to the following part of Section 5 of the Regulations governing their Licenses:—

"Where parties cutting under pretence of this License, are cutting on granted or private lands as well, the parties so cutting shall have two separate and distinct brows, and shall brow what lumber is cut from licensed Crown Lands in one brow, and what lumber is cut from granted lands in the other brow, and shall mark such logs coming from Crown Lands with a separate and distinct mark from those coming from granted lands."
