CITATION.

IN THE PROBATE COURT OF GLOUCESTER COUNTY.

To the Sheriff of the County of Gloucester, or any Constable within the said County,—GREETING:

WHEREAS Michael McKendy, Executor of the last Will and Testament of Mary Donnelly, late of the Parish of Bathurst, in the County of Gloucester, Widow, deceased, hath prayed that the heirs, devisees and next of kindred of the late Mary Donnelly may appear and show cause why license should not be granted to him to sell the real estate of said late Mary Donnelly, for the purpose of paying the debts of the deceased, for want of sufficient personal property for that purpose, and that such license may be granted. You are therefore required to cite Margaret Baldwin, Lucy McKendy, Ellen Leahy and Thomas Leahy her husband, Elizabeth Howell and James Howell her husband, Arthur Donnelly a minor, Mary Hachey and Donald Hachey her husband, Jacob White and Jacob White, Junior, all of the Parish of Bathurst, in the County of Gloucester, and John Donnelly, of Sydney, in New South Wales, in Australia, and Charles Donnelly, of Ashland, in the State of Wisconsin, in the United States of America, and all others interested, to appear before me at a Court of Probate to be held at the Court House Building, in the office of the Judge of Probate, in the Parish of Bathurst, within and for the said County of Gloucester, on **TUESDAY** the fifth day of **APRIL** next, 1904, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to show cause, if any, why license to sell said real estate should not be granted as prayed for.

His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor has been pleased to approve of the following Order in Council, passed on the 19th day of November, 1903:—

The Honourable the Surveyor General reports, for the information of the Committee of the Executive Council, that he has had under consideration the matter of issuing Licenses permitting persons to dig clams on the foreshores of Oak Bay and Waweig Bay, in the County of Charlotte, that various complaints have been made to the Department from time to time that non-residents of the Province have been accustomed, at certain seasons of the year, to enter upon the said foreshores and to deplete the clam beds thereof by digging and carrying away immense quantities for bait, whereby it is rendered impossible for the owners of lands fronting on said foreshores and for other residents of Charlotte County to procure clams for use or sale; that it has been further made to appear to the Department, that a continuance of the existing conditions in that respect will in a very few years absolutely destroy the clam beds of the places hereinbefore named, and it has seemed desirable that steps should be taken to procure for the residents of Charlotte County the benefit of said clam fisheries and to protect the same for the use of the persons naturally entitled thereto; the Surveyor General therefore recommends that the digging or taking of clams from the said foreshores, be in the future confined to such person and persons as shall take out a license therefor from the Department of the Crown Lands, which licenses be issued to all or any persons resident in Charlotte County, upon the payment of the sum of One dollar (\$1.00) per year, empowering said licensee to dig and carry away clams for consumption or sale, but not for sale or disposal for bait, said license to date from the first day of September in each year; and the Surveyor General further recommends, that for the purpose of carrying out the recommendation aforesaid, that Mr. Willard H. Berry be employed as overseer of clam fisheries for the said County of Charlotte for one year at a salary of \$500.00 with an allowance not exceeding \$50.00 for travelling expenses, that it be incumbent upon him, the said Willard H. Berry, to visit the said foreshores from time to time wherever clam digging is being carried on, to attend to the issuing of said licenses and the collection of the license fees payable therefor, to return said fees forthwith to the Department of the Surveyor General, and generally to attend to the protecting of the clam beds in said County, and to prevent all unlicensed persons from digging or carrying away clams therefrom; and in addition to the duties hereinbefore enumerated, he the said Willard H. Berry in consideration of the payment to him of the said sum of \$500, and without further remuneration, is to act during said year as lumber scaler upon all Crown Lands in the County of Charlotte, and all Crown Lands in the City and County of Saint John west of Ludgate Lake including (whether in St. John County or elsewhere) all Crown Lands under lease to the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, and also to act as Game and Fire Warden for the County of Charlotte; and the Surveyor General further recommends that the Order in Council previously passed relating to the digging of clams on the foreshores of Oak Bay and Waweig Bay be rescinded; and the Committee of Council concurs in the foregoing recommendation of the Surveyor General: Whereupon it is accordingly so ordered.
