PUBLIC NOTICE IS BEREBY GIVEN, That the Imperial Academy of Sciences at St. Petersburg offers a reward for information which may lead to the discovery of Baron Toll's Polar Expedition.

Baron Edward Toll, Chief of the Polar Expediton sent out by the Academy of Sciences, left the Bennett Island, lying north of New Siberia, on October 26th (November 8th), 1902, taking a southern direction. He was accompanied by the astronomer Seeberg and two Jakoots: Vassily Gorokhov, with the surname Chichak, and Nicolas Protodiakonow, with the surname Omook. The party seems to have been carried away by the ice.

As the researches hitherto made have been in vain a reward of five thousand (5000) roubles is offered by the Academy of Sciences for finding the whole expedition, or any part of it, and a reward of two thousand five hundred (2500) roubles for giving the first exact indications of tracing the party.

WHEREAS smallpox having made its appearance in the Parisy of Baker Lake, in a few families in three different school districts, and in each district children from infected families went to school up to a few days ago; as usual, since the outbreak of the disease in those families, and as such the whole of these districts are liable to develop the disease in a very short time; and, as the outlet of the Baker Lake Parish is through the Parish of Clair, this Board-

RESOLVES, It will be wise to quarantine the whole Parish of Baker Lake and close the two roads leading out of the Parish as the most efficient means to prevent the spreading of the disease in the adjoining parishes.

RESOLVED, Also, that every infraction of quarantine rules be dealt with severely according to public health act.
