NOTICE OF GRANTING LETTERS PATENT.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That under Chapter Eighty-five of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, 1903, and amending Acts, Letters Patent have been issued under the Great Seal of the said Province, bearing date the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1905, incorporating William S. Montgomery, of the Town of Dalhousie, in the County of Restigouche and Province of New Brunswick, Lumber Merchant; Robert Y. Blackhall, of the same place, Farmer; George E. Mercier, of the same place, Stevedore; Alexander J. LeBlanc, of the same place, Postmaster; Daniel McDonald, of the same place, Merchant; David Richards, of the Parish of Dalhousie, in said County, Lumber Merchant; H. Dow Sheals, of the Town of Campbellton, in said County, Boom Master; and Franklyn S. Blair, of the said Town of Campbellton, Accountant; for the following purposes, namely:—

To carry on and prosecute a general lumbering and wood manufacturing business together with a Foundry and Machine Shop, and also a general store and mercantile business, both wholesale and retail, and to do all such things as are incident to such objects.

To build, erect and establish and maintain Mills, Mill Buildings, Houses, Stores, Factories, Foundries and Machine Shops for the purposes aforesaid.

To establish, operate and conduct a general lumbering business with power to do all things necessary to supply their Mills and Factories with logs and lumber, and to manufacture the same in all

branches of wood manufacture, including, but without limitation by reason of express mention, deals, shingles, laths, sashes, doors and furniture, and also all manner of agricultural implements.

To erect and build houses, buildings and erections of all descriptions, whether of brick, stone or wood, and to contract for the same.

To establish, operate, manage and conduct a Foundry and Machine Shop for the manufacture of all kinds of machinery and iron work and also a general store and mercantile business, both wholesale and retail, with power to do business as General Merchants and Traders.

To purchase and hold lands in fee simple, or otherwise, including licenses and leases of Crown lands, with power to sell, lease and dispose of the same.

To purchase, hire, construct or manufacture for use in connection with the business of the Company any ships, barges, tug-boats, rolling stock, machinery or plant.

To construct, purchase and maintain any plant, buildings, works, factories, mills and other undertakings for the purposes of the Company, or connected therewith, or necessary or expedient for any of the purposes of the Company or incidental thereto.

To purchase, acquire, hold, use, sell, transfer and dispose of personal property of all kinds, including logs, deals, shingles, laths, furniture, sashes, doors, agricultural implements, machinery, patents, trade-marks, and all manner of wood and iron manufacture, and to lease, mortgage, sell, transfer and dispose of and otherwise deal with the whole or any part of the property, (real or personal), powers, privileges and franchises of the Company to any other Company or person, and to accept as consideration therefor any shares, stock, debentures or securities of any other Company, and generally to do all things necessary or expedient for carrying out the objects of the said Company, or any of them, or incidental thereto, subject, however, to the laws of the Province of New Brunswick.

To generate, use, sell, buy, accumulate, store, transmit, furnish and distribute electric current for light, heat or power, and to manufacture, buy, sell, operate, lease and let electric light fixtures, supplies and appurtenances used in connection therewith.

To operate any of the works of the Company by water, steam, electricity, compressed air or any other motive power, and generally to use water, steam, electricity, compressed air, or any other agency as a motive power or otherwise.

To establish and maintain booms, piers, wharves and boom piers necessary to the protection and shipment of the logs, lumber and manufactures of the Company; provided always, the same do not in anywise interfere with the navigation of any stream or river; by the name of "THE RESTIGOUCHE WOODWORKING COMPANY, Limited;" with a total Capital Stock of Fifty thousand dollars, divided into five hundred shares of One hundred dollars each.

And the Board of Directors of the said Company are authorized and empowered to borrow money upon the credit of the Company, and to issue bonds or debentures, and to sell, pledge or hypothecate the same for any sums borrowed, or deposit the same as collateral security for any promissory note, cheque or overdraft of the Company, at such prices or for such amounts as may be deemed expedient or necessary; but no such debentures or bonds shall be for a less sum than one hundred dollars; also to hypothecate or pledge the real or personal property of the Company to secure any sums borrowed by the Company, and to secure any bonds or debentures by the said real or personal property, or both; provided always, that the amount to be borrowed, or for which such bonds or debentures may be pledged or hypothecated, shall not at any time be greater than seventy-five per cent. of the actual paid up stock of the Company; provided further, however, that the limitations and restrictions on the borrowing powers of the Company to be contained in such provisions shall not apply to or include money borrowed by the Company on Bills of Exchange or promissory notes made, accepted or indorsed by the Company, or by overdraft, or otherwise, than on the bonds or debentures of the Company.
