

IN THE MATTER OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK JOINT STOCK COMPANIES' ACT.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the persons herein-after named will apply to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for a grant of a Charter for incorporation by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the Province of New Brunswick, according to the provisions of the New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies' Act, Chapter eighty-five of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, 1903, incorporating the applicants and such other persons as may hereafter become shareholders in the proposed Company, a body corporate and politic, under the name and for the purposes hereinafter stated:

1. The name of the proposed Company is to be "The Gold Coin Paint Co., Ltd."

2. The objects for which incorporation is sought are: To purchase or otherwise acquire and take over the paint manufacturing business recently carried on by the United Paint Company, Limited, of Dorchester, New Brunswick, and including patents of invention, and copyright and all other rights now owned by the Honorable Ambrose D. Richard, W. Frank Tait, Allan W. Chapman and C. Lionel Hannington hereinafter named.

To make, manufacture, mix, amalgamate, reduce, mine, mill, put up, buy, sell, exchange, and deal in paints, leads, clays, pigments, oils, whittings, colorings, fillings, stains, varnishes and every other substance or material of a like or similar nature, used in or suitable for preserving or decorating woods and other substances whatsoever, and to do all other matters and things incidental to the above objects.

To make, manufacture, buy, sell, and trade in tin cans, cases, hoxes, barrels, kegs and other receptacles made of tin, iron, wood or any other material or materials combined, and for the purposes aforesaid to purchase and deal in tins, irons, wood and every material necessary, whether manufactured or unmanufactured and to manufacture the same as required.

To carry on the business of printers, lithographers, stereotypers, electrotypers, engravers and to do printing in all its branches and all things incidental thereto.

To print labels, advertisements and to print, publish, conduct and circulate or otherwise deal in newspapers or other publications and do job printing in all its branches.

To enter into contracts for the building, painting, repairing and decorating of buildings of every description, and of bridges and structures of every kind. And for all the purposes aforesaid to purchase, lease, acquire, have, hold, sell, dispose of, pledge, hypothecate, and deal in paint, mines and clays and real and personal property of every description.

To have, hold, use and enjoy, purchase, acquire or dispose of Letters Patent of Invention and copyrights, patent rights and privileges, and to work, use, develop, and exercise the same and any in which the Company may become interested whether as owner, licensee or otherwise and to pay therefor in shares of said Company or otherwise.

To acquire by original subscription or otherwise and to purchase, hold, sell, transfer or otherwise dispose of or hypothecate the shares, stock, bonds, debentures or other obligations of any other company authorized to carry on business or undertaking within their powers, and to pay therefor in shares of the said Company or otherwise.

3. The office or principal place of business of the Company is to be at Dorchester, in the County of Westmorland, in the Province of New Brunswick.

4. The board of directors shall consist of seven members.

5. The amount of the capital stock of the proposed Company is twenty four thousand dollars, to be divided into 2400 shares of a par value of Ten dollars each.

PHYSICAL AND MILITARY TRAINING IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

ARRANGEMENTS have been made in relation to courses in Physical and Military Training during the summer vacation for teachers and prospective teachers throughout the Province.

Courses in physical training will be conducted at St. John and Fredericton beginning July 12th next. This course consists of approximately 30 lessons of one hour each. At the completion of the course a certificate is granted by the Militia Department. It is now necessary in order to obtain a license in this Province to have a certificate and after the end of the present school year all teachers must possess it to obtain advancement of class, and at the end of four years from the same date all schools must provide physical training by qualified instructors.

The text book used is "Physical Exercises" for use in public elementary schools (1909). It may be obtained from book sellers. This text book has been published by the Board of Education, England, and embodies the principles of Swedish drill. Whenever a sufficient number of teachers apply, a course in this subject at different centres throughout the Province will be provided for during the school terms, in order to enable the teachers to qualify with the least inconvenience, but teachers in remote districts should avail themselves of the summer schools to be provided at St. John and Fredericton.

Those proposing to attend these courses should, if possible, notify the chief superintendent of Education by the 10th of June in order that he may insure that a sufficient number of instructors will be available. The place at which it is desired to take the course should be mentioned.

A course in physical training will also be provided at the Summer School of Science for the Maritime Provinces to be

held this year at Liverpool, N. S., beginning July 13th next.

The Executive Council Strathcona Trust, has allowed three hundred and fifty dollars for rewards for physical training in the schools of New Brunswick for the coming year.

A course in Military Drill for male teachers and prospective teachers will be provided for those who desire a Grade A (Military) Certificate to qualify themselves for the organization and instruction of Cadet Corps at the Military Depot, Fredericton. They will be admitted only on the recommendation of the Chief Superintendent of Education, who must vouch for their professional standing; and as the number of candidates may be limited, those standing highest in the profession, with the best prospect of being able to organize and instruct a cadet corps, will receive the preference.

Application for admission should be made to the Chief Superintendent of Education not later than June 10th, quoting the class of license held, or better still (a) the school in which he is employed, (b) his class and length of service, (c) the railway station from which he will require a requisition for free transportation and (d) his address, which should be sure to find him promptly at any time from the middle of June to the date on which he must start for the school which opens on the 12th of July at the Military Depot, Fredericton.

This course will last six weeks. It consists of scouting, musketry, military drill, tactics and other military subjects which will qualify a teacher as a cadet corps instructor, or for what is sometimes called a "Military A Certificate." Physical training as now authorized for the schools will form a part of this course.

A transport requisition will be forwarded to those authorized to take the course. This, when tendered to a ticket agent will procure a first class railway ticket.

The actual expenses, such as cab fare, meals, etc., incurred in proceeding to and returning from the military depot, Fredericton, will be refunded by the Militia Department to those who obtain a certificate.

Those attending this course, will receive two dollars per day and will themselves arrange for their board and lodging. Those who do not already belong to a militia unit will be required to wear uniforms as for Corps of School Cadet Instructors, but without rank badges.

The uniform authorized for Corps of School Cadet Instructors is as follows:

Jacket—Reefer or double breasted pattern of blue black cloth or serge of ordinary civilian sack-coat length fastened in front by two rows of four buttons each of Canadian Militia pattern. Shoulder straps—Blue crash with gilt-metal rank badges. Trousers of serge to match color of jacket, no stripe at seams. Cap—Field service, infantry, blue. The uniform to be provided by those undergoing instruction.

It is suggested that the uniform be obtained after joining at the depot in order that uniformity may be secured.

A sword and belt should be provided. Teachers who pass this course and become officers in a regiment of the militia, or officers of the Corps of School Cadet Instructors, and train a cadet corps which passes inspection, will receive a bonus from the Militia Department.

This Military "A" Certificate qualifies an officer for the rank of Lieutenant in an infantry regiment.

Those authorized to undergo the course are to report to the Adjutant, No. 5 Regimental Depot, Royal Canadian Regiment, at Fredericton, N. B., at 10 o'clock a. m., the 12th of July.

In addition to the bonus granted by the Militia Department some three hundred and fifty dollars has been allotted by the Executive Council Strathcona Trust for the coming school year for rewards for militia drill and rifle shooting in New Brunswick.
