## GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

On the 7th instant His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor received the following despatch containing the sad intelligence of the death of His Most Gracious Majesty, King Edward the Seventh:-

I am commanded to inform you that His Excellency the Governor General has received with deepest distress the sad intelligence that His Majesty, King Edward VII., passed away at 11.45 yesterday evening, May 6th. Name assumed by new Sovereign and instructions for taking the oath of allegiance shall be telegraphed you as soon as I receive the necessary information.

On the 8th instant His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor also received the following despatch:-

I am commanded to inform you that a cablegram has been received by His Excellency the Governor-General, from the Colonial Secretary, as follows: "Orders have been issued by war office to all general officers commanding, excepting India, as follows: Monday, May 9: At noon hoist flag to masthead; fire a royal salute for His Majesty's succession. On the following day flag to be hoisted half mast, to be kept this way until funeral, date of which you will be notified. Act in concert with royal navy. Officers are to wear crepe on left arm of uniform and on same arm of great coats. Drums should be covered by black and crepe should be hung from top of colors staff, infantry regiment's standard staff, and trumpets of cavalry regiments until after funeral."

## PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, it hath pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord, King Edward the Seventh, of Blessed and Glorious Memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and all other His Late Majesty's Dominions, is solely and rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George, Prince of Wales:-

I, the said Lemuel John Tweedie, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, assisted by my Executive Council, and with their hearty and zealous concurrence, do therefore hereby Publish and Proclaim that the High and Mighty Prince George, Prince of Wales, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy and Glorious memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord, George the Fifth, By the Grace of God, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to whom are due all Faith and constant Obedience with all Hearty and Humble Affection;

And I do hereby Require and Command all Persons whomsoever to yield Obedience and Govern Themselves accordingly, Beseeching God, by whom Kings do Reign, to Bless the Royal Prince George the Fifth with long and happy years to reign over us.

Given at Fredericton this ninth day of May in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and ten.
