NOTICE OF GRANTING LETTERS PATENT.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN. That under "The New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies' Act, 1893," and amending Acts, Letters Patent have been issued under the Great Seal of the Province of New Brunswick, bearing date the ninth day of November A. D. 1899, incorporating John Sealy, Merchant, Thomas Gorman, Merchant, Fred A. Jones, Merchant, G. Wetmore Merritt, Merchant, James D. Seely, Merchant, and Walter H. Trueman, Barrister-at-Law, all of the City of John, in the Province of New Brunswick; for the following purposes:—To carry on a general printing, publishing and advertising business, the printing, publication and selling of news, literary and advertising sheets, books, pamphlets and all forms of printed matter, the erection, ownership and control of news, advertising and book stands at Railway and Steamship depots, the vending of newspapers and books on Railroad trains and Passenger steamers, and to have all powers connected with or incidental to the furtherance of the above objects; by the name of "The Dominion Railways Advertising Company, (Limited)"; with a total Capital Stock of Ten thousand dollars, divided into two hundred shares of Fifty collars each.

EXTRACT from Chapter XXV., Statutes of Canada, 1869: "An Act respecting certain Offences relative to Her Majesty's Army and Navy."

ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as

Whosoever not being an enlisted soldier in Her Majesty's service, or a seaman in Her Majesty's Naval service, by word or with money, or by any other means whatever, directly or

indirectly persuades or procures, or goes about or endeavours to persuade, prevail on or procure any such soldier or seamen to desert, or leave Her Majesty's Military or Naval service, or conceals, receives or assists any deserter from Her Majesty's Military or Naval service, knowing him to be such deserter, may be convicted thereof in a summary manner before any two Justices of the Peace, or before the Mayor of any city and any one Justice of the Peace, or before any Recorder, Judge of the Sessions of the Peace or Police Magistrate, on the evidence of one or more credible witness or witnesses, and shall then be liable to a penalty not less than eighty dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars, in the discretion of the Court before which the conviction takes place, with costs, and in default of payment may be committed to gaol for any period not exceeding six months, or until such penalty is paid.

Whosoever buys, exchanges or detains, or other wise receives

from any soldier or deserter, any arms, clothing or furniture belonging to Her Majesty, or any such article belonging to any soldier or deserter as are generally deemed regimental necessaries, according to the custom of the Army, or causes the colour of such clothing or articles to be changed, or exchanges, buye or receives from any soldier any provisions. changes, buys or receives from any soldier any provisions, without leave in writing from the Officer commanding the regiment or detachment to which such soldier belongs, may be convicted thereof in the manner mentioned in the next preceding section, and shall then be liable to a penalty of not less than twenty dollars, nor more than forty dollars and costs, and in default of payment be committed to gaot for a period

not exceeding nine months, or until such p-nalty is paid.

One half the amount of any penalty imposed under any of the preceding sections shall be paid over to the prosecutor or erson by whose means the offender has been convicted, and the other moiety shall belong to the Crown.

Any person reasonably suspected of being a deserter from Her Majesty's Service, may be apprehended and brought for examination before any Justice of the Peace, and if it appears that he is a deserter, he shall be confined in gaol until claimed. by the military or naval authorities, or proceeded against according to law

No person shall break open any building to search for a deserter unless he has obtained a warrant for that purpose deserter unless he has obtained a warrant for that purpose from a Justice of the Peace, such warrant to be founded on affidavit that there is reason to believe that the deserter is concealed in such building, and that admittance has been demanded and refused; and any person resisting the execution of any such warrant shall thereby incur a penalty of eighty dollars, recoverable on summary conviction in like manner as any other penalties under this Act.

Any Justice of the Peace upon information on each are

Any Justice of the Peace, upon information on oath or affirmation, may issue a warrant for the apprehension of any person charged with an offence against this Act, as in the case of other offences against the law.

REWARDS.

A reward, without any deduction whatever, of £2 sterling will be paid to any person who shall apprehend and place in safe custody any deserter from Her Majesty's Army, provided he acted of his own knowledge, and not on information laid by another person.

To the person giving such information as shall lead to the arrest of a deserter from Her Majesty's Army, a reward of £1 sterling will be paid, and to the person who effects the arrest of such deserter the reward shall be £1, without any deductions whatever in either case.

The name of any person giving information about deserters will not be divulged.
