### ASSEMBLY CHAMBER,

FREDERICTON, WEDNESDAY, April 3, 1901.

THIS day, at 12 o'clock, noon, His Honor the Honorable ABNER REID McCLELAN, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, came to the Assembly Chamber, and being seated on the Thorne, after assenting to the several Bills passed during the Session, was pleased to close the Session with the following

### SPEECH:

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentleman of the Legislative Assembly,

"I have to thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the various public services, and can assure you that the moneys you have granted to His Majesty, will be carefully expended in the public interest.

"During the Session which is now about to close, you have been called upon to consider many important measures, the passage of which will, I trust, tend to promote the welfare of the Province and advance its best interests.

"The unremitting attention which you have given to the consideration of these Measures, and to the performance of your other Legislative duties, deserves the highest commendation.

"Now that you are about to be relieved from further attendance upon your Parliamentary labours, I desire to express the sincere hope that abundant success may attend you in the various avocations in which you are engaged."

### PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province was convened on the twenty-eighth day of February last past, and continued its Sittings until this day, being the third day of April instant, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to THURSDAY the second day of MAY next.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the third day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of His Majesty's Reign.

A PROCLAMATION, requiring all persons being in office or authority at the decease of the Late Queen to proceed in the execution of their respective offices.

WHEREAS by Act of Assembly passed during the present Session of the Legislative Assembly, intituled "An Act respecting Public Officers on Demise of the Crown," it is amongst other things in effect enacted, that upon the Demise of the Crown, it shall not be necessary to renew any commission, by virtue whereof any public officer or functionary in the Province of New Brunswick held his office or profession during the previous reign, but that a Proclamation shall be issued by the Lieutenant-Governor authorizing all persons in office who held commissions under the late Sovereign, and all functionaries who exercised any profession by virtue of any such commissions to continue in the exercise of their respective duties, functions and professions; and that such Proclamation shall suffice, and that the incumbents shall, as soon thereafter as may be, take the usual and customary oath of allegiance before the proper officer or officers thereunto appointed,—

Now THEREFORE, by and with the advice of my Council, I do hereby authorize all persons in office as officers of the Province of New Brunswick, who at the time of the demise of our late Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria, of glorious memory, were duly and lawfully holding, or were duly and lawfully possessed of or invested in any office, place or employment within the Province of New Brunswick, or who held commissions under the late Sovereign, and all functionaries who exercised any profession by virtue

of such commissions, to severally continue in the due exercise of their respective duties, functions and professions; for which this Proclamation shall be sufficient warrant.

And I do ordain that all incumbents of such offices and functions, and all persons holding commissions as aforesaid (other than those who have already done so) shall, as soon hereafter as possible, take the usual and customary oath of allegiance to His Majesty King Edward the Seventh, before the proper officer or officers thereunto appointed.

And I do hereby require and command all loving subjects of His Majesty to be aiding, helping and assisting all such officers of the Province of New Brunswick and other functionaries in the performance and execution of their respective offices and places.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, this Twenty-fifth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and One, and in the First Year of His Majesty's Reign.
