Given under my hand and seal, at Fredericton, the Fourteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and in the Second year of His Majesty's Reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

E. L. NEWCOMBE, DEPUTY MINISTER OF JUSTICE, WHEREAS, Thursday, the twenty-second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven has been fixed for Our Coronation;

And Whereas, We are desirous that the said day should be observed as a day of general thanksgiving and rejoicing throughout Canada.

Now therefore, Know Ye that We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, to appoint and set apart Thursday, the said twenty-second day of June, as a public holiday to be observed as a day of general thanksgiving and rejoicing by all persons throughout Our Dominion of Canada.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness, Our Right Trusty and Right Well-Beloved Cousin and Councillor, the Right Honourable Sir Albert Henry George, Earl Grey, Viscount Howick, Baron Grey of Howick, in the County of Northumberland, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, and a Baronet; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and

Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order, etc. etc., Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this Twenty-Second Day of May, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and in the second year of Our Reign.
