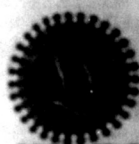

NOTICE RE JOINT STOCK COMPANIES.

IN preparing a petition under "The New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies' Act," attention is directed to the following requirements, one or more of which are frequently overlooked by petitioners:

1. A copy of the notice with an affidavit of publication should accompany the petition.
2. The petition should recite all the facts set forth in the notice.

3. The facts stated in the petition should be verified by affidavit.

4. The affidavit with reference to the name of the Company should follow the words of the Statute to the effect "that the proposed name is not that of any other known Company, incorporated or unincorporated, or any name liable to be confounded therewith, or otherwise on public grounds objectionable."

5. The powers should be limited to the actual requirements of the Company.

6. The signatures to the petition should be verified by affidavit.

Reference to and Compliance with the terms of the New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies' Act in this connection will frequently prevent delay in the issue of Letters Patent.
